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# High points for the membrane model in the critical dimension* 

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#### Abstract

In this notice we study the fractal structure of the set of high points for the membrane model in the critical dimension $d=4$. The membrane model is a centered Gaussian field whose covariance is the inverse of the discrete bilaplacian operator on $\mathbb{Z}^{4}$. We are able to compute the Hausdorff dimension of the set of points which are atypically high, and also that of clusters, showing that high points tend not to be evenly spread on the lattice. We will see that these results follow closely those obtained by O. Daviaud [3] for the 2-dimensional discrete Gaussian Free Field.


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## 1 The model

The field of random interfaces has been widely studied in statistical mechanics. These interfaces are described by a family of real-valued random variables indexed by the $d$-dimensional integer lattice, which are considered as a height configuration, namely they indicate the height of the interface above a reference hyperplane. The probability of a configuration depends on its energy (the Hamiltonian), which defines a measure on the space of such configurations. The most well-known models are the so-called gradient model, in particular the Discrete Gaussian Free Field (DGFF), or harmonic crystal, whose Hamiltonian is a function of the discrete gradient of the heights, and the membrane model. The study of such interface was firstly undertaken by Sakagawa in [8]; we are aware of the contributions of Kurt ([6], [7]) regarding also a phenomenon called entropic repulsion in dimension 4.
The Membrane Model is a Gaussian multivariate random variable whose Hamiltonian depends on the mean curvature of the interface, in particular favors configurations whose curvature is approximately constant. It is indeed a lattice-based scalar field $\left\{\varphi_{x}\right\}_{x \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}}$ where $\varphi_{x} \in \mathbb{R}$ is viewed as a height variable at the site $x$ of the lattice. There are three convenient and equivalent ways in which one can see such a field. Denote by $V_{N}:=[-N, N]^{d} \cap \mathbb{Z}^{d}$ the centered box of side-length $2 N+1$. Then

1. the membrane model is the random interface model whose distribution is given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbf{P}_{N}(\mathrm{~d} \varphi)=\frac{1}{Z_{N}} \exp \left(-\frac{1}{2} \sum_{x \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}}\left(\Delta \varphi_{x}\right)^{2}\right) \prod_{x \in V_{N}} \mathrm{~d} \varphi_{x} \prod_{x \in \partial_{2} V_{N}} \delta_{0}\left(\mathrm{~d} \varphi_{x}\right) \tag{1.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\Delta$ is the discrete Laplacian, $\partial_{2} V_{N}:=\left\{y \in V_{N}^{c}: d\left(y, V_{N}\right) \leq 2\right\}$ and $Z_{N}$ is the normalizing constant.
2. By re-summation, the law $\mathbf{P}_{N}$ of the field is the law of the centered Gaussian field on $V_{N}$ with covariance matrix

$$
G_{N}(x, y):=\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{y}\right)=\left(\Delta_{N}^{2}\right)^{-1}(x, y)
$$

Here, $\Delta_{N}^{2}(x, y)=\Delta^{2}(x, y) 1_{\left\{x, y \in V_{N}\right\}}$ is the Bilaplacian with 0 -boundary conditions outside $V_{N}$.
3. The model is a centered Gaussian field on $V_{N}$ whose covariance matrix $G_{N}$ satisfies, for $x \in V_{N}$,

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{lc}
\Delta^{2} G_{N}(x, y)=\delta_{x y}, & y \in V_{N} \\
G_{N}(x, y)=0, & y \in \partial_{2} V_{N}
\end{array}\right.
$$

For $d \geq 5$ the infinite volume Gibbs measure $P$ exists [5, Prop. 1.2.3] and is the law of the centered Gaussian field with covariance matrix

$$
G(x, y)=\Delta^{-2}(x, y)
$$

The membrane model presents several points in common, as well as challenging differences, from the more known DGFF. The former lacks some key features of the latter, namely

1. the random walk representation for the Green's function. In the harmonic crystal, it is possible to establish the well-known relation involving the covariance matrix $\Gamma_{N}:$

\begin{equation*}
\Gamma_{N}(x, y)=\mathbb{E}^{x}\left(\sum_{n=1}^{\tau_{\partial V_{N}}-1} \mathbf{1}_{\left\{S_{n}=y\right\}}\right) \tag{1.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\mathbb{E}^{x}$ is the law of a standard random walk $\left(S_{n}\right)_{n \geq 0}$ started at $x \in \mathbb{Z}^{2}$ and $\tau_{\partial V_{N}}$ is the first exit time from $V_{N}$.
2. Absence of monotonicity, for example the FKG inequality.

It is thus not possible to rely on harmonic analysis to control the field, and this renders many problems solved for the harmonic crystal quite intractable. Despite the lack of such tools it is sufficient to establish two crucial properties to study the high points: one is the logarithmic bound on covariances which are explained in Lemma 2.1, and the other one is the 2-Markov property, which can be stated as follows:

Definition 1.1 (2-Markov property). Let $A, B \subseteq V_{N}$ and $\operatorname{dist}(A, B) \geq 3$. Then $\left\{\varphi_{x}\right\}_{x \in A}$ and $\left\{\varphi_{x}\right\}_{x \in B}$ are independent under the conditional law

$$
\mathbf{P}_{N}\left(\cdot \mid \sigma\left(\left\{\varphi_{x}, x \notin A \cup B\right\}\right)\right) .
$$

This suggests that the behavior of certain Gaussian fields with respect to exceedences is universal, in the sense that as soon as the model displays a Gibbs-Markov property and covariances decay at the same rate, then the behavior of high points is the same (with some small adjustments to be done according to the dimension). This

also opens up the question of whether there are other points in common between logcorrelated Gaussian fields, and we believe a more precise answer will be given soon.
The starting point is understanding how many "high" points viz. points that grow more than the average there are typically. The first step is to find the average height of the field, in other words to show that there exists a constant $c>0$ such that

\mathbf{E}\left(\max _{x \in V_{N}} \varphi_{x}\right) / \log N \xrightarrow{N \rightarrow+\infty} c .
$$

Theorem 1.2 ([6, Theorem 1.2]). Let $d=4, \ell \in(0,1)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
V_{N}^{\ell}:=\left\{x \in V_{N}: d\left(x, V_{N}^{c}\right) \geq \ell N\right\} \tag{1.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

and let $g:=8 / \pi^{2}$. Then
(a)

$$
\lim _{N \rightarrow+\infty} \mathbf{P}\left(\sup _{x \in V_{N}} \varphi_{x} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \log N\right)=0
$$

(b) If $0<\ell<1 / 2,0<\eta<1$ there exists $C=C(\ell, \eta)>0$ such that

$$
\mathbf{P}\left(\sup _{x \in V_{N}^{\ell}} \varphi_{x} \geq(2 \sqrt{2 g}-\eta) \log N\right) \leq \exp \left(-C \log ^{2} N\right) .
$$

Roughly said, the first-order approximation of the maximum is of order $\log N$, which also implies that the field behaves approximately like independent variables. For us then an $\alpha$-high point will be a point whose height is greater than $2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N$. The behavior of $\alpha$-high points for the 2-dimensional DGFF, as shown in [3], tells us that such points exhibit a fractal structure. Very similar results were obtained by Dembo, Peres, Rosen and Zeitouni in [4] for the set of late points of the 2-d standard random walk. To begin with, we recall the definition of the discrete fractal dimension:

Definition 1.3 (Discrete fractal dimension, [1]). Let $A \subseteq \mathbb{Z}^{d}$. If the following limit exists, the fractal dimension of $A$ is

\operatorname{dim}(A):=\lim _{N \rightarrow \infty} \frac{\log \left|A \cap V_{N}\right|}{\log N}
$$

The fractal dimension of the high points is given then in
Theorem 1.4 (Number of high points). Let $\ell \in(0,1)$, and

$$
\mathcal{H}_{N}(\eta):=\left\{x \in V_{N}^{\ell}: \varphi_{x} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \eta \log N\right\}
$$

be the set of $\eta$-high points.
(a) For $0<\eta<1$ we obtain the following limit in probability:

$$
\lim _{N \rightarrow+\infty} \frac{\log \left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\eta)\right|}{\log N}=4\left(1-\eta^{2}\right) .
$$

(b) For all $\delta>0$ there exists a constant $C>0$ such that for $N$ large

$$
\mathbf{P}_{N}\left(\left\{\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\eta)\right| \leq N^{4\left(1-\eta^{2}\right)-\delta}\right\}\right) \leq \exp \left(-C \log ^{2} N\right)
$$

We can push further the comparison between the DGFF and the Membrane Model at their respective critical dimensions, and one can find an interesting similarity in the behavior of the points. [3] for example also showed that high points appear in clusters; this is what occurs in the membrane model, as the following two theorems show:

Theorem 1.5 (Cluster of high points 1). Let

$$
D(x, \rho):=\left\{y \in V_{N}:|y-x| \leq \rho\right\}
$$

For $0<\alpha<\beta<1$ and $\delta>0$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\lim _{N \rightarrow+\infty} \max _{x \in V_{N}^{\ell}} \mathbf{P}_{N}\left(\left|\frac{\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)}{\log N}-4 \beta\left(1-(\alpha / \beta)^{2}\right)\right|>\delta\right)=0 . \tag{1.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

Theorem 1.6 (Cluster of high points 2). For $0<\alpha<1,0<\beta<1$ and $\delta>0$ we have

$$
\lim _{N \rightarrow+\infty} \max _{x \in V_{N}^{\ell}} \mathbf{P}\left(\left.\left|\frac{\log \left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)\right|}{\log N}-4 \beta\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)\right|>\delta \right\rvert\, x \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right)=0 .
$$

It is also possible to evaluate the average number of pairs of high points as in the following theorem:

Theorem 1.7 (Pairs of high points). Let $0<\alpha<1,0<\beta<1$ and let

$$
\begin{gathered}
F_{h, \beta}(\gamma):=\gamma^{2}(1-\beta)+\frac{h(1-\gamma(1-\beta))^{2}}{\beta} \\
\Gamma_{\alpha, \beta}:=\left\{\gamma \geq 0: 4-4 \beta-4 \alpha^{2} F_{0, \beta}(\gamma) \geq 0\right\}=\left\{\gamma \geq 0:\left(1-\alpha^{2} \gamma^{2}\right) \geq 0\right\}, \\
\rho(\alpha, \beta):=4+4 \beta-4 \alpha^{2} \inf _{\gamma \in \Gamma_{\alpha, \beta}} F_{2, \beta}(\gamma)>0 .
\end{gathered}
$$

Note that $\Gamma_{\alpha, \beta}=[0,1 / \alpha]$ is independent of $\beta$. Then the following limit in probability holds:

$$
\lim _{N \rightarrow+\infty} \frac{\log \left|\left\{(x, y) \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha):|x-y| \leq N^{\beta}\right\}\right|}{\log N}=\rho(\alpha, \beta) .
$$

Finally we can also show what the maximum width of a spike of given length is:
Theorem 1.8 (The biggest high square). Let $-1<\eta<1, D_{N}(\eta)$ the side length of the biggest sub-box for which all height variables are uniformly greater than $2 \sqrt{2 g} \eta \log N$, i. e.

$$
D_{N}(\eta):=\sup \left\{a \in \mathbb{N}: \exists x \in V_{N}^{\ell}: \min _{y \in B(x, a)} \varphi_{y} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \eta \log N\right\}
$$

Then the following limit in probability holds:

$$
\lim _{N \rightarrow+\infty} \frac{\log D_{N}(\eta)}{\log N}=\frac{1-\eta}{2}
$$

The paper is organized as follows: in Section 2 we will prove some preliminary results that will be used for the proofs of the main theorems, to which Section 3 is going to be devoted.

## 2 Preliminary Lemmas and results

## Notation

$D(x, a)$ (resp. $D(x, a])$ denotes the open (resp. closed) Euclidean ball of center $x$ and radius $a$, while $B(x, a)$ is a box centered at $x$ of side length $a$. For the rest of this notice, recall the definition (1.3) and we let once and for all $\ell \in(0,1 / 2)$. Let $x_{0} \in V_{N}$ and

$$
M_{\alpha}:=\left\{x_{0}+i\left(N^{\alpha}+4\right): i \in N^{4} \text { and } x_{0}+i\left(N^{\alpha}+2\right) \subset V_{N}\right\}
$$

We denote by $x_{B}$ the center of a (sub)box $B$ and as $\Pi_{\alpha}$ the union of sub-boxes of sidelength $N^{\alpha}$ (without discretization issues) and midpoint in $M_{\alpha} . \mathscr{F}_{\alpha}$ will be the sigmaalgebra generated by $\left\{\varphi_{x}\right\}$ for $x \in \bigcup_{B \in \Pi_{\alpha}} \partial_{2} B$. Practically we denote with $\Pi_{\alpha}$ a set of disjoint boxes separated by layers of thickness 2 , which thanks to the 2-Markov property will enable us to perform a decomposition procedure on these sets.
Furthermore $\varphi_{B}:=\mathbf{E}\left(\varphi_{x_{B}} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)$ and $\operatorname{Var}_{B}\left(\varphi_{x}\right):=\operatorname{Var}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)$.

### 2.1 Lemmas

### 2.1.1 The function $\bar{G}_{N}(\cdot, \cdot)$

In order to prove some of the next results we will introduce the convolution of the harmonic Green's function, which will prove to be a key tool to obtain the crucial estimates on the covariances of our model. Let $A$ be an arbitrary subset of $\mathbb{Z}^{4}$, and for $x \in A$ let $\Gamma_{A}(x, \cdot)$ be the solution of the discrete boundary value problem

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{lc}
\Delta \Gamma_{A}(x, y)=\delta_{x y}, & y \in A \\
\Gamma_{A}(x, y)=0, & y \in \partial A
\end{array}\right.
$$

Note that $\Gamma_{N}$ as in (1.2) is the unique solution to the above problem for $A:=V_{N}$. The convolution of $\Gamma_{N}$ is

$$
\bar{G}_{N}(x, y):=\sum_{z \in V_{N}} \Gamma_{N}(x, z) \Gamma_{N}(z, y), \quad x, y \in V_{N}
$$

[6] contains several bounds and properties of such a function, and we would like here to recall those that we are going to use in the sequel: for all $x, y \in V_{N}$

- symmetry: $\bar{G}_{N}(x, y)=\bar{G}_{N}(y, x)$,
- [6, Lemma 2.2] if $\ell \in(0,1 / 2)$ there exist $c_{1}=c_{1}(\ell)>0, c_{2}>0$ such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
g \log N+c_{1} \leq \bar{G}_{N}(x, y) \leq g \log N+c_{2} \tag{2.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

With this in mind it is now easier for us to show how to bound the variances and covariances of our field.

Lemma 2.1 (Bounds on the variances). Let $d=4$ and $0<\delta<1$. Then

- there exists $C>0$ such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sup _{x \in V_{N}} \operatorname{Var}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}\right) \leq g \log N+C \tag{2.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

- There exists $C(\ell)>0$ such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sup _{x \in V_{N}^{e}}\left|\operatorname{Var}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}\right)-g \log N\right| \leq C(\ell) \tag{2.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

- There exist $C>0$ and $C(\ell)>0$ such that

$$
\begin{align*}
& \sup _{\substack{x, y \in V_{N}^{\ell} \\
x \neq y}} \operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{y}\right)-g(\log N-\log |x-y|) \leq C .  \tag{2.4}\\
& \sup _{\substack{x, y \in V_{N}^{\ell} \\
x \neq y}}\left|\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{y}\right)-g(\log N-\log |x-y|)\right| \leq C(\ell) . \tag{2.5}
\end{align*}
$$

Proof. For the variances see [6, Proposition 1.1]. For the covariances, remember that in [6, Corollary 2.9] that for all $d \geq 4$ and for all $x \in V_{N}^{\ell}$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sup _{y \in V_{N}^{\ell}}\left|G_{N}(x, y)-\bar{G}_{N}(x, y)\right| \leq c=c(\ell)<+\infty \tag{2.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

It is therefore sufficient to show that (2.4) and (2.5) hold for $\bar{G}(\cdot, \cdot)$. But we have from [6, Lemma 2.10], that there exists a constant $K$ such that in $d=4$ for $x \neq y$ and all $\alpha \in(0,2)$

$$
\bar{G}_{N}(x, x)-\bar{G}_{N}(x, y)=g \log |y-x|+K+o\left(|y-x|^{-\alpha}\right) .
$$

Hence

$$
\begin{aligned}
& G_{N}(x, y) \leq \bar{G}_{N}(x, y)+c=\bar{G}_{N}(x, x)-g \log |y-x|+K^{\prime} \stackrel{(2.1)}{\leq} \\
& \leq g \log N-g \log |y-x|+K^{\prime} .
\end{aligned}
$$

The other bound follows similarly by considering (2.5).
Next we give a decomposition of the field which is similar to the one existing for the DGFF (see for example [9, Section 2.1]). With this in mind, we can prove that conditioning on the values of the field assumed on the double boundary of a subset of $V_{N} \subseteq \mathbb{Z}^{4}$ (in fact of any $\mathbb{Z}^{d}$ ) the resulting field is again the membrane model restricted to the interior of the smaller domain.
Lemma 2.2. Let $B \subseteq V_{N}$. Let $\mathscr{F}:=\sigma\left(\varphi_{z}, z \in V_{N} \backslash B\right)$. Then

$$
\left\{\varphi_{x}\right\}_{x \in B} \stackrel{d}{=}\left\{\mathbf{E}_{N}\left[\varphi_{x} \mid \mathscr{F}\right]+\psi_{x}\right\}_{x \in B}
$$

where " $\stackrel{d}{=}$ " indicates equality in distribution, in particular under $\mathbf{P}_{N}(\cdot)$
(a) $\psi_{x} \Perp \mathscr{F}$;
(b) $\left\{\psi_{x}\right\}_{x \in B}$ is distributed as the membrane model with 0 -boundary conditions on $B$.

Proof. Set $\psi_{x}:=\varphi_{x}-\mathbf{E}\left[\varphi_{x} \mid \mathscr{F}\right]$ for all $x \in B$. We have to show that the above results hold.
(a) It is clear from the definition.
(b) Being $\mathbf{P}_{N}$ a Gibbs measure, it satisfies the DLR equation: for all $A \subseteq V_{N}, \mathscr{F}_{A^{c}}:=$ $\sigma\left(\varphi_{z}, z \in A^{c}\right)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbf{P}_{N}\left(\cdot \mid \mathscr{F}_{A^{c}}\right)(\eta)=P_{A, \eta}(\cdot) \quad \mathbf{P}_{N}(\mathrm{~d} \eta)-\text { a.s. } \tag{2.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

with

$$
P_{A, \eta}(\mathrm{~d} \varphi)=\frac{1}{Z_{A}} \exp \left(-\frac{1}{2} \sum_{x \in \mathbb{Z}^{d}}\left(\Delta \varphi_{x}\right)^{2}\right) \prod_{x \in A} \mathrm{~d} \varphi_{x} \prod_{x \in V_{N} \backslash A} \delta_{\eta_{x}}\left(\mathrm{~d} \varphi_{x}\right)
$$

In other words, $P_{A, \eta}$ is a Gaussian distribution with covariance matrix $\left(\Delta_{A}^{2}\right)^{-1}$. Since $\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\cdot, \cdot \mid \mathscr{F}_{A^{c}}\right)$ we find out that it equals $G_{A}$. In our case this means that $\operatorname{Cov}_{N}(\cdot \mid \mathscr{F})$ is deterministic and equal to $G_{B}$. So

$$
\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\psi_{x}, \psi_{y}\right)=\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\psi_{x}, \psi_{y} \mid \mathscr{F}\right)=\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{y} \mid \mathscr{F}\right)=G_{B}(x, y)
$$

Remark 2.3. This result gives us a decomposition of the membrane model in all dimensions.

Lemma 2.4. Let $0<\alpha<1$ and $0<\beta<1, \delta>0$ and we define

$$
S=S(\epsilon):=\left\{(x, y) \in V_{N}^{\ell}: N^{\beta(1-\epsilon)} \leq|x-y| \leq N^{\beta}\right\} .
$$

Then there exist $C, \epsilon_{0}>0$ (which can be chosen uniformly on $(\alpha, \beta)$ on compact sets of $\left.(0,1)^{4}\right)$ and $\gamma_{\star}:=2(2-\beta)^{-1}$ such that for all $\epsilon \leq \epsilon_{0}$ and all $N$

$$
\max _{(x, y) \in S} \mathbf{P}\left(x, y \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right) \leq C N^{-4 \alpha^{2} F_{2, \beta}\left(\gamma_{\star}\right)+\delta} .
$$

Proof. Let $Z:=\varphi_{x}+\varphi_{y}$ and we see that

$$
\left\{x, y \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right\} \subseteq\{Z \geq 4 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N\}
$$

We obtain also from (2.4) that

$$
\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{y}\right) \leq g \log N-g \beta(1-\epsilon) \log N+O(1)
$$

Thus by (2.6) and (2.2)

$$
\operatorname{Var}_{N}(Z) \leq(2 g(2-\beta)+O(\epsilon)+O(1 / \log N)) \log N .
$$

Since $F_{2, \beta}\left(\gamma_{\star}\right)=\gamma_{\star}$, using (2.8)

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathbf{P}(Z \geq 4 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N) \leq \\
\leq & \exp \left(-\frac{16(\sqrt{2 g})^{2} \alpha^{2} \log ^{2} N}{2((2 g(2-\beta)+O(\epsilon)+O(1 / \log N)) \log N}\right) \leq \\
\leq & \exp \left(-4 \alpha^{2} \gamma^{*}(1+O(\epsilon)+O(1 / \log N)) \log N\right) \leq \\
\leq & C N^{-4 \alpha^{2} F_{2, \beta}\left(\gamma_{\star}\right)+O(\epsilon) .}
\end{aligned}
$$

Lemma 2.5. Let $B:=B\left(x, 4 N^{\beta}\right), \epsilon>0, b^{ \pm}(\alpha, \beta, \epsilon, N)=2 \sqrt{2 g}(\alpha(1-\beta) \pm \epsilon) \log N$, $I(\alpha, \beta, \epsilon, N):=\left[b^{-}(\alpha, \beta, \epsilon, N), b^{+}(\alpha, \beta, \epsilon, N)\right]$. Then

$$
\left.\max _{x \in V_{N}^{\ell}} \mathbf{P}\left(\varphi_{B} \notin I(\alpha, \beta, \epsilon, N)\right) \mid \varphi_{x} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N\right)^{N \rightarrow+\infty} 0 .
$$

Proof. We shorten $I, b^{+}$and $b^{-}$for the above quantities. We recall here two useful facts about normal random variables (whose short proof is postponed to the appendix). If $X \sim \mathcal{N}(0,1)$ then

For $\eta>0$ we obtain with (2.8) and (2.9)

& \leq o(1)+\mathbf{P}\left(\varphi_{B} \notin I \mid \varphi_{x} \in(1,1+\eta) 2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

High points for the membrane model in the critical dimension

Now we write $\varphi_{x}=\varphi_{x}-\varphi_{B}+\varphi_{B}$ and observe that $\varphi_{B} \Perp \varphi_{x}-\varphi_{B}$. Therefore $\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{B}\right)=\operatorname{Var}_{N}\left(\varphi_{B}\right)$ and so there exists $Z \sim \mathcal{N}\left(0, \sigma_{Z}^{2}\right), \sigma_{Z}^{2}>0$, for which

If $x$ is the center of $B \subseteq C$ we can decompose the variances as $\operatorname{Var}_{C}\left(\varphi_{x}\right)=\operatorname{Var}_{C}\left(\varphi_{B}\right)+$ $\operatorname{Var}_{B}\left(\varphi_{x}\right)$, and with this

& \leq \mathbf{P}\left(Z+\left((1-\beta)+O\left(\frac{1}{\log N}\right)\right)(1+\eta) 2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N \geq b^{+}\right) \rightarrow 0
\end{aligned}
$$

for $\eta<\epsilon /(\alpha(1-\beta))$. Similarly

& \mathbf{P}\left(\varphi_{B} \leq b^{-} \mid \varphi_{x} \in(1,1+\eta) 2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N\right) \leq \\
& \leq \mathbf{P}\left(Z+\left((1-\beta)+O\left(\frac{1}{\log N}\right)\right) 2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N \leq b^{-}\right) \rightarrow 0
\end{aligned}
$$

Lemma 2.6. We keep the notation of Lemma 2.4. Let $0<\alpha<\beta<1$ and $\delta>0$. For $(x, y) \in S$ define $T(x, y)$ as the set of sub-boxes of side length $2 N^{\beta}$ such that the centered subbox of side length $N^{\beta}$ contains $x, y$. Then we can find $C, \epsilon_{0}>0$ such that for $\epsilon \leq \epsilon_{0}$ and all $N$

& \leq C N^{-4 \alpha^{2} F_{2, \beta}\left(\min \left\{\gamma, \gamma_{\star}\right\}\right)+\delta} .
\end{aligned}
$$

$\epsilon_{0}$ can be chosen uniformly on $(\alpha, \beta)$ on compact sets of $(0,1)^{4}$.
Proof. Define

We distinguish two cases:
$\gamma \geq \gamma_{\star}$. We have $\mathbf{P}(E) \leq \mathbf{P}\left(\left\{x, y \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right\}\right)$ : the claim follows from Lemma 2.4 because $\min \left\{\gamma, \gamma_{\star}\right\}=\gamma_{\star}$.
$\gamma<\gamma_{\star}$. It follows from the definition of $\gamma_{\star}$ that $\gamma<\gamma_{\star}$ implies $\gamma<2(2-\beta)^{-1}$. For this reason set $a:=1-\gamma(1-\beta)>0$ and $b:=\gamma(2-\beta)-2<0$. Letting $Z:=a\left(\varphi_{x}+\varphi_{y}\right)+b \varphi_{B}$

E \subseteq\{Z \geq(2 a+b \gamma(1-\beta)) \alpha 2 \sqrt{2 g} \log N\}
$$

Furthermore we have the usual decomposition

& \operatorname{Var}_{N}(Z)=a^{2} \mathbf{V a r}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}\right)+a^{2} \operatorname{Var}_{N}\left(\varphi_{y}\right)+b^{2} \mathbf{V a r}_{N}\left(\varphi_{B}\right)+ \\
& +2 a b \mathbf{C o v}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{B}\right)+2 a b \mathbf{C o v}_{N}\left(\varphi_{y}, \varphi_{B}\right)+ \\
& +2 a^{2} \mathbf{C o v}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{y}\right) . \tag{2.10}
\end{align*}
$$

By Lemma 2.1

$$

and

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{B}\right)=\mathbf{E}\left(\mathbf{E}\left(\varphi_{x} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right) \mathbf{E}\left(\varphi_{x_{B}} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)\right)= \\
& =\operatorname{Cov}_{N}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{x_{B}}\right)-\operatorname{Cov}\left(\varphi_{x}, \varphi_{x_{B}} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right) \geq \\
& \geq g\left(\log N-\log \left|x-x_{B}\right|\right)-g\left(\beta \log N-\log \left|x-x_{B}\right|\right)+O(1)= \\
& =g(1-\beta) \log N+O(1)
\end{aligned}
$$

Analogously

Define the auxiliary function $f(a, b, \beta):=2 a^{2}(2-\beta)+b^{2}(1-\beta)+4 a b(1-\beta)$. We use these bounds in (2.10) to obtain

& =(\gamma \beta)^{2}(1-\beta)+2 \beta a^{2}= \\
& =\beta\left(\beta \gamma^{2}(1-\beta)+2 a^{2}\right)= \\
& =\beta\left((2 a+b)(1-a)+2 a^{2}\right)= \\
& =\beta(2 a+b-a b)
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence

\operatorname{Var}_{N}(Z) \leq(\beta(2 a+b-a b)+O(\epsilon)+O(1 / \log N)) g \log N \tag{2.11}
\end{equation*}

Since $2 a+b-a b=2 a+b \gamma(1-\beta)$ (2.10) and (2.11) yield

This allows us to conclude the proof.
Finally we would like to recall
Lemma 2.7 ([6, Lemma 2.11]). Let $0<n<N, A_{N} \subseteq \mathbb{Z}^{4}$ be a box of side-length $N$, $A_{n} \subseteq A_{N}$ a box of side-length $n$. Let $0<\epsilon<1 / 2$. There exists $C>0$ such that for all $x \in A_{n}$ with $\left|x-x_{B}\right|<\epsilon n$

$$

Remark 2.8. In [6] the above Lemma is stated with the assumption that "the boxes $A_{n}$ and $A_{N}$ have the same centerÂt'Ât'. However one sees that the result can be obtained removing this condition which is not necessary.

## 3 Five theorems

Proof of Theorem 1.4. The core of the proof is the lower bound (b) which was already proved by [6, Theorem 1.3] and is based on the hierarchical decomposition of the membrane model, similar to that of the DGFF (for the main idea supporting the proof we also refer to [2]). We show here for the reader's convenience the upper bound, in order to obtain the desired limit in probability.
Proof of Theorem 1.4 (a). For any $\delta>0$ one can apply Chebyshev's inequality to get

\leq & N^{-4\left(1-\eta^{2}\right)-\delta} N^{4} \max _{x \in V_{N}} \mathbf{P}\left(\varphi_{x} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \eta \log N\right) \leq \\
\leq & N^{-4\left(1-\eta^{2}\right)-\delta} N^{4} \exp \left(-\frac{8 g \eta^{2} \log ^{2} N}{2 g \log N+C}\right) \leq N^{-4\left(1-\eta^{2}\right)-\delta} N^{4-4 \eta^{2}} \rightarrow 0
\end{aligned}
$$

where we have used Lemma 2.1 too.
Proof of Theorem 1.5. We choose $\eta, \delta>0$ and define

\begin{gathered}
D_{+}:=\left\{\varphi_{B} \leq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \eta \log N\right\} \\
C_{+}:=\left\{\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)\right| \geq N^{\left.4 \beta\left(1-(\alpha / \beta)^{2}\right)-\delta\right)}\right\}
\end{gathered}
$$

and for an $\epsilon>0$ to be fixed later

$$
A:=\bigcup_{y \in B\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)}\left\{\left|\mathbf{E}\left(\varphi_{y} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)-\varphi_{B}\right| \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \epsilon \log N\right\} .
$$

By Lemma 2.7 $\operatorname{Var}_{N}\left(\varphi_{B}-\mathbf{E}\left(\varphi_{y} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)\right) \leq c$ (we may assume that $B\left(x, N^{\beta}\right) \subsetneq V_{N}^{\ell}$ ), and so

\mathbf{P}(A)=O\left(N^{4 \beta} \exp \left(-c \log ^{2} N\right)\right)
$$

tends to 0 . Furthemore also $\mathbf{P}\left(D_{+}^{c}\right)$ tends to 0 by virtue of the bounds on covariances and (2.8). We then have

& \leq o(1)+\mathbf{P}\left(\left|\mathcal{H}_{4 N^{\beta}}\left(\frac{\alpha-\epsilon^{\prime}}{\beta}\right)\right| \geq N^{\left.4 \beta\left(1-(\alpha / \beta)^{2}\right)-\delta\right)}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\epsilon^{\prime}$ satisfies

\frac{\alpha-\epsilon^{\prime}}{\beta} \log \left(4 N^{\beta}\right)=(\alpha-\eta-\epsilon) \log N
$$

By tuning the parameters $N$ large enough and $\eta, \epsilon$ small enough we can obtain

(roughly speaking, we have $\epsilon^{\prime} \approx \alpha(1-\beta)$ ). By Theorem 1.4

and from this the claim follows. We now go to the lower bound proof, which is similar in spirit to the upper bound. By setting

C_{-}:=\left\{\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)\right| \leq N^{\left.4 \beta\left(1-(\alpha / \beta)^{2}\right)-\delta\right)}\right\}
$$

we also define

$$
\mathcal{H}_{N}^{s}(\eta):=\left\{x \in V_{N}^{s}: \varphi_{x} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \eta \log N\right\}, \quad s \in(0,1 / 2)
$$

We observe that

$$
\begin{aligned}
& \mathbf{P}\left(C_{-}\right)=\mathbf{E}\left(\mathbf{P}\left(C_{-} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)\right) \leq \mathbf{P}(A)+\mathbf{P}\left(D_{-}^{c}\right)+\mathbf{E}\left(\mathbf{P}\left(C_{+} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right) \mathbf{1}_{A^{c} \cap D_{-}}\right) \leq \\
& \leq o(1)+\mathbf{P}\left(\left|\mathcal{H}_{4 N^{\beta}}^{3 / 8}\left(\frac{\alpha+\epsilon^{\prime}}{\beta}\right)\right| \leq N^{\left.4 \beta\left(1-(\alpha / \beta)^{2}\right)-\delta\right)}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\epsilon^{\prime}$ satisfies

\frac{\alpha+\epsilon^{\prime}}{\beta} \log \left(4 N^{\beta}\right)=(\alpha+\eta+\epsilon) \log N
$$

and we conclude as before.
Proof of Theorem 1.6. We will use the notation $b^{ \pm}(\alpha, \beta, \eta, N)$ as in the proof of Lemma 2.5. We will also introduce the following quantities: let $B:=B\left(x, 4 N^{\beta}\right)$, and for $\eta, \delta>0$,

Lower bound. Thanks to the proof of Lemma 2.5 we have $\mathbf{P}(E \mid G)=\mathbf{P}(E \mid F \cap G) \mathbf{P}(F \mid G)+$ $o(1)=\mathbf{P}(E \mid F \cap G)(1+o(1))+o(1)$. This means that

& \mathbf{P}(E \mid F, G)=\frac{\mathbf{P}(E \cap F \cap G)}{\mathbf{P}(F \cap G)} \leq \frac{1}{\mathbf{P}(F \cap G)} \sqrt{\mathbf{P}(G) \mathbf{P}(E \cap F)}= \\
& =\frac{1}{\mathbf{P}(F \mid G) \mathbf{P}(G)} \sqrt{\mathbf{P}(G) \mathbf{P}(F) \mathbf{P}(E \mid F)}= \\
& \stackrel{\text { Lemma }}{ }_{=}^{2.5}(1+o(1)) \sqrt{\frac{\mathbf{P}(F)}{\mathbf{P}(G)} \mathbf{P}(E \mid F)} .
\end{aligned}
$$

We know by the bounds (2.2) and (2.9)

\mathbf{P}(G) & =\mathbf{P}\left(\varphi_{x} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \alpha \log N\right) \geq c_{1} \frac{\exp \left(-\frac{8 g \alpha^{2} \log ^{2} N}{2 g \log N+c_{2}}\right)}{c_{3} \log N} \geq \\
& \geq \exp \left(-d^{\prime} \log N\right) \\
\mathbf{P}(F) & =\mathbf{P}\left(\varphi_{B} \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g}(\alpha(1-\beta)-\eta) \log N\right) \leq \\
& \leq c_{4} \exp \left(-\frac{8 g(\alpha(1-\beta)-\eta)^{2} \log ^{2} N}{2 g(1-\beta) \log N+c_{5}}\right) \leq \exp \left(-d^{\prime \prime} \log N\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

for some $d^{\prime}, d^{\prime \prime}>0$. Therefore we can find $d>0$ such that $\mathbf{P}(F) / \mathbf{P}(G) \leq \exp (d \log N)$ and to show the result it suffices to prove that $\mathbf{P}(E \mid F) \leq \exp \left(-c \log ^{2} N\right)$ for a positive $c$. For this purpose define

A:=\bigcup_{y \in B}\left\{\left|\mathbf{E}\left(\varphi_{y} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right)-\varphi_{B}\right| \geq 2 \sqrt{2 g} \epsilon \log N\right\} .

From Lemma 2.7 it follows that $\mathbf{P}(A) \leq \exp \left(-c \log ^{2} N\right)$ for $c>0$ and from (2.9) that $\mathbf{P}(F) \geq \exp (-d \log N)$ for some $d>0$, all in all $\mathbf{P}(A \mid F) \leq \exp \left(-O\left(\log ^{2} N\right)\right)$. So we

can write

& \exp \left(-O\left(\log ^{2} N\right)\right)+\frac{\mathbf{E}\left(\mathbf{P}\left(E \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right) \mathbf{1}_{A^{c}} \mathbf{1}_{F}\right)}{\mathbf{P}(F)}
\end{aligned}
$$

If we are on $A^{c} \cap F$, then

\begin{align*}
& \mathbf{P}\left(\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)\right| \leq N^{4 \beta\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)-\delta} \mid \mathscr{F}_{\partial_{2} B}\right) \leq \\
& \leq \mathbf{P}\left(\left|\mathcal{H}_{4 N^{\beta}}^{3 / 8}\left(\alpha+\epsilon^{\prime}\right)\right| \leq N^{4 \beta\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)-\delta}\right) \tag{3.1}
\end{align*}
$$

where $\epsilon^{\prime}$ is such that

(\alpha-(\alpha(1-\beta)-\eta)+\epsilon) \log N=\left(\alpha+\epsilon^{\prime}\right) \log 4 N^{\beta} \tag{3.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

From Theorem 1.4 we know that (3.1) is bounded from above by $\exp \left(-c \log ^{2} N\right)$ for a constant $c>0$, provided that $\epsilon^{\prime}$ is small (which can be obtained if $\eta, \epsilon$ and $N$ are small, small and large respectively).

Upper bound. Let $K \in \mathbb{N}$ and $\left\{\beta_{j}:=\frac{j}{K} \beta\right\}_{1 \leq j \leq K}$. Then let

& \left\{\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D\left(x, N^{\beta}\right)\right| \geq N^{4 \beta\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)+\epsilon}\right\} \subseteq \\
& \subseteq \bigcup_{0 \leq i \leq N}\left\{\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D_{i}\right| \geq N^{4 \beta_{i}\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)+\epsilon / 2}\right\}
\end{aligned}
$$

as soon as $N$ is large. It is then sufficient to prove that for all $i$

\mathbf{P}\left(\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D_{i}\right| \geq N^{4 \beta_{i}\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)+\epsilon / 2} \mid x \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right) \xrightarrow{N \rightarrow+\infty} 0
$$

We can consider $\beta_{j}$ 's for which $4 \beta_{j}\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)+\epsilon / 2 \leq 4 \beta_{j}$. Let $B_{j}:=B\left(x, 4 N^{\beta_{j}}\right)$,

& \mathbf{P}(C \cap F \mid G) \stackrel{\text { Chebyshev inq. }}{\leq} \frac{N^{-4 \beta_{j}\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)-\epsilon / 2}}{\mathbf{P}(G)} \mathbf{E}\left(\mathbf{1}_{F \cap G}\left|\mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha) \cap D_{j}\right|\right)= \\
& =\frac{N^{-4 \beta_{j}\left(1-\alpha^{2}\right)-\epsilon / 2}}{\mathbf{P}(G)} \mathbf{E}\left(\sum_{y \in D_{j}} \mathbf{1}_{\left\{x, y \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right\}} \mathbf{1}_{F}\right) \leq \\
& \leq \frac{N^{4 \beta_{j} \alpha^{2}-\epsilon / 2}}{\mathbf{P}(G)} \sup _{y \in D_{j}} \mathbf{P}\left(\left\{x, y \in \mathcal{H}_{N}(\alpha)\right\} \cap F\right) . \tag{3.3}
\end{align*}
$$

By the bounds on the covariance and the normal distribution we have

Proof of Theorem 1.7. Preliminary we would like to make some considerations. It holds that $\rho(\alpha, \beta)$ is positive and in particular

Moreover notice that $\rho(\alpha, \beta)$ is increasing in $\beta$. If we set $\gamma_{m}:=\inf _{\gamma \in \Gamma_{\alpha, \beta}} F_{2, \beta}(\gamma)$, $\gamma_{*}:=\inf _{\gamma \geq 0}$ and $\gamma_{+}:=\sup \Gamma_{\alpha, \beta}$ we have $\gamma_{*} \leq \gamma_{m} \leq \gamma_{+}$and moreover since $F_{h, \beta}(\cdot)$ does not depend on $\alpha$ as well as $\Gamma_{\alpha, \beta}$ does not depend on $\beta$ we have $\gamma_{m}=\min \left\{\gamma_{*}, \gamma_{+}\right\}$. that

\gamma_{+}=1 / \alpha \geq 1
$$

We are now ready to prove the lower and upper bounds.
Lower bound. We set

Theorem $1.4^{(\mathrm{a})}$ shows that $\mathbf{P}\left(D^{c}\right) \rightarrow 0$. Hence we rewrite

\end{aligned}

where we have used the assumption that $h$ is close to 1 and Lemma 2.4
$\gamma_{*}>\gamma_{m}$. We construct for each $B \in \Pi_{\beta^{\prime}}$ a bigger box of size $4 N^{\beta^{\prime}}$ by juxtaposing to it the 12 adjacent subboxes of same side length. We call the set of such bigger boxes $\mathcal{B}$, and for each $B^{\prime} \in \mathcal{B}$ we center in $x_{B^{\prime}}$ a box of twice bigger volume as $B^{\prime}$. The latter boxes belong to a new set named $\mathcal{C}$. We remark that all pairs of points within distance $N^{\beta^{\prime}}$ must belong to at least one $B^{\prime} \in \mathcal{B}$. since $\left|\Pi_{\beta^{\prime}}\right|=O\left(N^{4\left(1-\beta^{\prime}\right)}\right)$. So noticing that $\alpha\left(\gamma_{m}+\epsilon\right)=(1+\alpha \epsilon)$

C_{k}:=\left\{\left|D_{k}\right| \geq n_{k}\right\}
\end{gathered}
$$

We denote the biggest box of $\underline{B}^{(k)}$ with $B_{1, k}$. Let $B$ be a box of side length $N^{\alpha_{k} / 2}$ centered in $B_{1, k}$. Let $n_{k}:=N^{\kappa+4 \alpha(k-1) \frac{(1-\lambda)^{2}}{K}}$, where $\kappa$ is the constant appearing in [7, Lemma 3.2]. Define moreover for $\epsilon>0$

If $B \in \Pi_{\beta}$ we indicate with $B^{(1 / 4)}$ the sub-box $B\left(x_{B}, N^{\beta} / 2\right)$. Choose $\epsilon>0$ and define

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[^1]:    ${ }^{(a)}$ The idea is to scale the square: now we take the box with mesh $N / N^{\beta}$ and the grid is made by $\left\{x_{B}: B \in\right.$ $\left.\Pi_{\beta}\right\}$. In this way Theorem 1.4 tells us that $\mathcal{H}_{N^{1-\beta}}(\gamma \alpha) \approx N^{4(1-\beta)\left(1-\gamma^{2} \alpha^{2}\right)}=N^{m_{\gamma}}$.
