ANNUAL REPORTS.

The Annual Meeting of the American Mathematical Society was held in New York on Friday afternoon, December 27th, at three o'clock, the President, Dr. Hill, in the Chair. There were twenty-five members present. Reports were presented by the Secretary and Treasurer. The Secretary stated that the membership of the Society was 267. The average attendance at the ordinary meetings during the year had been 15, the attendance at the last annual meeting 17, and that at the summer meeting 26. The number of members who had attended at least one meeting during the year was 61. Professor Cole, Dr. Chittenden and Professor Ladue were appointed an auditing committee to examine the Treasurer's accounts.

The Chair appointed Mr. Legras and Mr. Lambert tellers for the annual election. Upon examining the ballots cast in person and by mail, they announced that the following ticket had been elected:
