# A nilpotent Whitehead theorem for TQ-homology of structured ring spectra

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#### Abstract

The aim of this short paper is to prove a TQ-Whitehead theorem for nilpotent structured ring spectra. We work in the framework of symmetric spectra and algebras over operads in modules over a commutative ring spectrum. Our main result can be thought of as a TQ-homology analog for structured ring spectra of Dror's generalized Whitehead theorem for topological spaces; here TQ-homology is short for topological Quillen homology. We also prove retract theorems for the TQ-completion and homotopy completion of nilpotent structured ring spectra.

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### 1 Introduction

In this paper we work with algebraic structures in symmetric spectra, or  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules, that can be described as algebras over an operad  $\mathcal{O}$  which is reduced, meaning that  $\mathcal{O}[0] = *$ , the trivial  $\mathcal{R}$ -module; such  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras are non-unital. Here, we assume that  $\mathcal{R}$  is any commutative monoid object in the category  $(\mathsf{Sp}^{\Sigma}, \otimes_S, S)$  of symmetric spectra [19, 31]; in other words,  $\mathcal{R}$  is a commutative ring spectrum, and we denote by  $(\mathsf{Mod}_{\mathcal{R}}, \wedge, \mathcal{R})$  the closed symmetric monoidal category of  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules.

Topological Quillen homology, or TQ-homology for short, is the analog for *O*-algebras of the ordinary integral homology of spaces. There is an extensive literature, but it is useful to start with [13, 25, 29], followed by [11, 12, 16, 30] along with [2, 3, 4, 20, 22, 23], among others. A study of the homotopy completion tower, which is weakly equivalent to the Goodwillie Taylor tower [14, 21] of the identity functor on *O*-algebras (see, for instance, [18, 20, 24, 27]), is carried out in [18], where the TQ-completion construction is introduced as the analog for *O*-algebras of the Bousfield-Kan [5] integral completion of spaces; a study of TQ-completion is carried out in [6, 7] for connected *O*-algebras. The homotopy completion tower is exploited in [18] to establish a TQ-Serre Finiteness Theorem; also proved, using similar tools, are a TQ-Hurewicz theorem and a TQ-Whitehead theorem, which generalize earlier results in this direction to *O*-algebras. These are analogs of the Serre Finiteness, Hurewicz, and Whitehead theorems that are well-known for spaces; each of these theorems for TQ-homology starts with the assumption that the *O*-algebra is connected.

In this paper we explore the possibility of removing the connectivity assumption from an  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, in the case of the TQ-Whitehead theorem, by replacing "connected  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra" with "nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra"; this is motivated by Dror's generalized Whitehead theorem for spaces [8] which replaced "simply connected space" with "nilpotent space" in the original Whitehead theorem for spaces.

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Our approach, which is somewhat indirect and was motivated by the work in [1], is to play off the homotopy completion and TQ-completion constructions against each other: more precisely, we resolve the cosimplicial TQ-resolution of an  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra X, whose homotopy limit is the TQ-completion of X, term-by-term via the homotopy completion tower, but with respect to the operad  $\tau_{M-1}\mathcal{O}$  characterizing M-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras (Remark 2.5). We use this to establish a nilpotent TQ-completion retract result (Theorem 2.12), and as a consequence, we establish the following nilpotent TQ-Whitehead theorem.

**Theorem 1.1** (Nilpotent TQ-Whitehead theorem). Let  $\mathcal{O}$  be an operad in  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules with  $\mathcal{O}[0] = *$ . Let  $M \geq 2$  and suppose X, Y are M-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras (Definition 2.3). Consider any map  $f \colon X \to Y$  of  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras. Then f is a weak equivalence if and only if f induces a weak equivalence  $\mathsf{TQ}(X) \simeq \mathsf{TQ}(Y)$  on  $\mathsf{TQ}$ -homology. Here we are assuming that  $\mathcal{O}$  satisfies Assumption 2.1.

To keep this paper appropriately concise, we freely use notation from [18].

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## 2 Nilpotent structured ring spectra

The following basic assumption ensures, in particular, that the forgetful functor from  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras to the underlying category of  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules preserves cofibrant objects; see, for instance, [26, 28, 33].

**Assumption 2.1.** Let  $\mathcal{O}$  be an operad in  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules and consider the associated unit map  $I \to \mathcal{O}$ . Assume that  $I[r] \to \mathcal{O}[r]$  is a flat stable cofibration between flat stable cofibrant objects in  $\mathsf{Mod}_{\mathcal{R}}$  for each  $r \geq 0$  ([18, 7.7]).

Recall from [18] that associated to the operad  $\mathcal{O}$  is the tower of operads

$$\tau_1 \mathcal{O} \leftarrow \tau_2 \mathcal{O} \leftarrow \cdots \leftarrow \tau_{n-1} \mathcal{O} \leftarrow \tau_n \mathcal{O} \leftarrow \cdots$$
 (2.1)

where

$$(\tau_n \mathcal{O})[t] := \left\{ \begin{array}{ll} \mathcal{O}[t], & \text{for } t \leq n, \\ *, & \text{otherwise,} \end{array} \right.$$

In other words,  $\tau_n \mathcal{O}$  is the operad built from  $\mathcal{O}$  by truncating  $\mathcal{O}$  above level n, where \* denotes the trivial  $\mathcal{R}$ -module. If X is an  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, then the tower (2.1) of operads induces the *completion* tower [18, 3.8] of X

 (2.2)

of  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras whose limit is the *completion*  $X^{\wedge}$  of X. To make this construction homotopy meaningful, one can derive everything in sight by constructing the *homtopy completion tower* [18, 3.13] of X

$$\tau_{1}\mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}}^{\mathsf{h}}(X) \leftarrow \tau_{2}\mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}}^{\mathsf{h}}(X) \leftarrow \cdots \leftarrow \tau_{n-1}\mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}}^{\mathsf{h}}(X) \leftarrow \tau_{n}\mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}}^{\mathsf{h}}(X) \leftarrow \cdots$$

$$(2.3)$$

of  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras whose homotopy limit is the homotopy completion  $X^{h\wedge}$  of X.

**Remark 2.2.** For instance, if  $\mathcal{O}$  is the operad whose algebras are the non-unital commutative algebra spectra (i.e., where  $\mathcal{O}[t] = \mathcal{R}$  for each  $t \geq 1$  and  $\mathcal{O}[0] = *$ ), then the tower (2.2) is isomorphic to the usual X-adic completion of X tower of the form

$$X/X^2 \leftarrow X/X^3 \leftarrow \cdots \leftarrow X/X^n \leftarrow X/X^{n+1} \leftarrow \cdots$$
 (2.4)

where  $X/X^n$  denotes the  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra with underlying  $\mathcal{R}$ -module defined by the pushout diagram  $(n \geq 2)$ 

$$X^{\wedge n} \xrightarrow{m_n} X$$

$$\downarrow \qquad \qquad \downarrow$$

$$* \xrightarrow{} X/X^n$$

in  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules; here,  $m_n$  denotes the usual multiplication map.

**Definition 2.3.** Let X be an  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra and  $M \geq 2$ . We say that X is M-nilpotent if the map of t-ary operations  $\mathcal{O}[t] \wedge X^{\wedge t} \to X$  factors as

$$\mathcal{O}[t] \wedge X^{\wedge t} \to * \to X$$
 for each  $t \ge M$ ,

where \* denotes the trivial  $\mathcal{R}$ -module; in other words, if all the M-ary operations of X and higher are trivial.

**Remark 2.4.** Each term  $X/X^n$  in (2.4) is an *n*-nilpotent non-unital commutative algebra spectrum, and similarly, each term  $\tau_n \mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (X)$  in the completion tower (2.2) is an (n+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra.

**Remark 2.5.** Since M-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras  $(M \geq 2)$  are the same as  $\tau_{M-1}\mathcal{O}$ -algebras equipped with  $\mathcal{O}$ -action maps (Proposition 2.6), for ease of notational purposes (in the various subscripts) we often state assumptions in terms of (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras  $(N \geq 1)$ .

**Proposition 2.6.** If X is an  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra and  $N \geq 1$ , then X is (N+1)-nilpotent if and only if the left  $\mathcal{O}$ -action map  $\mathcal{O} \circ (X) \to X$  factors as

$$\mathcal{O} \circ (X) \to (\tau_N \mathcal{O}) \circ (X) \to X$$

through a  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebra structure on X. In other words, (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras are the same as  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebras equipped with  $\mathcal{O}$ -action maps induced by restriction along  $\mathcal{O} \to \tau_N \mathcal{O}$ .

*Proof.* This follows immediately from Definition 2.3.

Q.E.D.

Remark 2.7. It is natural to ask, if we start with a small diagram of  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebras, and we compute its limit (resp. colimit) in  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras versus in  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebras, when are they isomorphic? Since all small limits, filtered colimits, and reflexive coequalizers are created in the underlying category of  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules by the forgetful functor (see, for instance, [15, 17]), for both  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras and  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebras, it follows that (N+1) nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras are closed under all small limits, filtered colimits, and reflexive coequalizers. On the other hand, since cofibrant replacement of an (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, as an  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, involves gluing on cells of  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras that are not nilpotent,

in general, a left derived functor evaluated on a fixed (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra will often take on different values depending on whether it is left derived on  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras versus on  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebras. Note that since the category of  $\tau_1 \mathcal{O}$ -algebras is isomorphic to the category of left  $\mathcal{O}[1]$ -modules [18], 2-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras are the same as left  $\mathcal{O}[1]$ -modules equipped with a trivial  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra structure induced by restriction along  $\mathcal{O} \to \tau_1 \mathcal{O}$ .

If  $N \geq 1$ , repeated application of the functorial factorization construction in [18, 5.48] shows that the upper horizontal finite tower in (2.5) may be factored as

$$\mathcal{O} \longrightarrow \tau_N \mathcal{O} \longrightarrow \tau_{N-1} \mathcal{O} \longrightarrow \cdots \longrightarrow \tau_2 \mathcal{O} \longrightarrow \tau_1 \mathcal{O}$$

$$\stackrel{(*)}{(\#)} \simeq \qquad \stackrel{(\#)}{(\#)} \simeq$$

where the maps (\*) are cofibrations of operads, the maps (#) are weak equivalences of operads, and  $J_n$  is reduced for each  $1 \le n \le N$ .

The following is proved in [18, 5.49(b)].

**Proposition 2.8.** Let  $1 \leq n < N$ . If  $X \in \mathsf{Alg}_{J_N}$  is cofibrant, then X is also cofibrant in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ . Similarly, if  $X \in \mathsf{Alg}_{J_n}$  is cofibrant, then X is also cofibrant in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{J_{n+1}}$ .

If X is an (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, then its  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra structure is induced from its underlying  $\tau_N \mathcal{O}$ -algebra structure via the composite map

$$\mathcal{O} \circ (X) \to \tau_N \mathcal{O} \circ (X) \to X.$$

Hence we may start with any (N + 1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra X, and consider the functorial cofibrant replacement

$$* \to \tilde{X} \xrightarrow{\simeq} X$$
 (2.6)

of X in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{J_N}$ , which is also a cofibrant replacement of X in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ ; we are using the positive flat stable model structure (see, for instance, [15, 18]).

**Definition 2.9.** If X is an (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, then its  $\mathsf{TQ}$ -homology (resp.  $\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}$ -homology) is the  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra

$$\begin{split} \mathsf{TQ}(X) := \tau_1 \mathcal{O} \circ^h_{\mathcal{O}}(X) &\simeq J_1 \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (\tilde{X}) \\ \text{resp.} \qquad \mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}(X) := \tau_1 \mathcal{O} \circ^h_{\tau_N \mathcal{O}}(X) &\simeq J_1 \circ_{J_N} (\tilde{X}) \end{split}$$

Here, "TQ-homology" is an abbreviation for "topological Quillen homology".

Remark 2.10. In other words,  $\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathsf{Nil}_{N+1}}(X)$  is the topological Quillen homology of X (i.e., the derived indecomposable quotient of X) with respect to  $\tau_N\mathcal{O}$ -algebras, while  $\mathsf{TQ}(X)$  is the the derived indecomposable quotient of X with respect to  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras; it may be helpful to note that  $\tau_1\tau_N\mathcal{O}=\tau_1\mathcal{O}$ . The indicated weak equivalences are consequences of [18, 4.10].

This construction comes with a TQ-Hurewicz map of the form  $X \to \mathsf{TQ}(X)$ , given by the map  $\tilde{X} \to J_1 \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (\tilde{X})$  in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ , and iterating this Hurewicz map leads to a cosimplicial resolution of X with respect to TQ-homology of the form

$$X \longrightarrow \mathsf{TQ}(X) \Longrightarrow (\mathsf{TQ})^2(X) \Longrightarrow (\mathsf{TQ})^3(X) \cdots$$

(see Remark 2.11) given by the map of cosimplicial  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras

$$\tilde{X} \longrightarrow J_1 \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (\tilde{X}) \Longrightarrow J_1 \circ_{\mathcal{O}} J_1 \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (\tilde{X}) \Longrightarrow \cdots$$
 (2.7)

where  $\tilde{X}$  is regarded as a constant cosimplicial diagram. Recall [6, 18] that applying holim<sub> $\Delta$ </sub>(-) to the map of cosimplicial  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras in (2.7) gives the TQ-completion map of the form  $X \to X_{TO}^{\wedge}$ .

**Remark 2.11.** Throughout this paper we have suppressed the codegeneracy maps from the diagrams, for ease of notational purposes.

Similarly, there is a  $\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}$ -Hurewicz map of the form  $X \to \mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}(X)$ , given by the map  $\tilde{X} \to J_1 \circ_{J_N} (\tilde{X})$  in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ , and iterating this Hurewicz map leads to a cosimplicial resolution of X with respect to  $\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}$ -homology of the form

$$X \longrightarrow \mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}(X) \Longrightarrow (\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}})^2(X) \Longrightarrow (\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}})^3(X) \cdots$$

given by the map of cosimplicial  $J_N$ -algebras (and by restriction along  $\mathcal{O} \to J_N$ , also a map of cosimplicial  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras)

$$\tilde{X} \longrightarrow J_1 \circ_{J_N} (\tilde{X}) \Longrightarrow J_1 \circ_{J_N} J_1 \circ_{J_N} (\tilde{X}) \Longrightarrow \cdots$$
 (2.8)

where  $\tilde{X}$  is regarded as a constant cosimplicial diagram, and applying  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(-)$  to the map of cosimplicial  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras gives the  $\mathsf{TQ}|_{\operatorname{Nil}_{N+1}}$ -completion map of the form  $X \to X^{\wedge}_{\mathsf{TQ}|_{\operatorname{Nil}_{N+1}}}$ .

The map of operads  $\mathcal{O} \to J_N$  induces a commutative diagram of the form

and applying  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(-)$  gives the left-hand commutative diagram of the form (2.9).

**Theorem 2.12** (Nilpotent TQ-completion retract theorem). Let  $\mathcal{O}$  be an operad in  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules with  $\mathcal{O}[0] = *$ . Let  $N \geq 1$ . If X is an (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, then there is a left-hand commutative diagram of the form

in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$  with natural map (\*) a weak equivalence. In particular, the  $\mathsf{TQ}$ -completion map  $X \to X_{\mathsf{TQ}}^{\wedge}$  fits into the right-hand retract diagram in the homotopy category  $\mathsf{Ho}(\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}})$ , natural in X. Here we are assuming that  $\mathcal{O}$  satisfies Assumption 2.1.

The purpose of the rest of this section is to prove Theorems 2.12 and 1.1. Let's verify that the comparison map (\*) is a weak equivalence. Our approach is to resolve the coaugmented cosimplicial diagram (2.8) of  $J_N$ -algebras term-by-term with the finite tower  $\{J_n \circ_{J_N} (-)\}_n$ , where  $1 \leq n \leq N$ ; we are motivated by the work in [1]. This leads to the commutative diagram in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$  of the form

We will show by induction up the finite tower that  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(\#)_n$  is a weak equivalence for each  $1 \leq n \leq N$ . Since the bottom horizontal coaugmented cosimplicial diagram has extra codegeneracy maps  $s^{-1}$  ([10, 6.2]) induced by the map  $J_N \to J_1$ , by cofinality [9, 3.16] it follows that  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(\#)_1$  is a weak equivalence. To make further progress, we must identify the homotopy fibers of these towers.

**Proposition 2.13.** Let Z be a cofibrant  $J_N$ -algebra. There is a zigzag of weak equivalences of towers of the form

$$\{\tau_n J_N \circ_{J_N} (Z)\}_n \simeq \{J_n \circ_{J_N} (Z)\}_n$$

natural with respect to all such Z; here,  $1 \le n \le N$ .

*Proof.* There is a zigzag of weak equivalences of the form

$$\tau_{n}J_{N} \circ_{J_{N}} (Z) \xleftarrow{\simeq} |\operatorname{Bar}(\tau_{n}J_{N}, J_{N}, Z)| \xrightarrow{\simeq}$$

natural in all such Z; we are freely using the "Bar" notation from [18, 4.10].

**Proposition 2.14.** Let Z be a cofibrant  $J_N$ -algebra. For each  $2 \le n \le N$ , there is a homotopy fiber sequence of the form

$$F_n(Z) \to J_n \circ_{J_N} (Z) \to J_{n-1} \circ_{J_N} (Z)$$

in  $Alg_{\mathcal{O}}$ , natural in all such Z, where  $F_n(Z)$  is defined by

$$F_n(Z) := i_n J_N \circ_{\tau_1 J_N}^{\mathsf{h}} \left( \tau_1 J_1 \circ_{J_1} J_1 \circ_{J_N} (Z) \right) \tag{2.10}$$

*Proof.* By Proposition 2.14, together with [18, 4.21], there is a homotopy fiber sequence of the form

$$i_n J_N \circ_{\tau_1, J_N}^{\mathsf{h}} \left( \tau_1 J_N \circ_{J_N} (Z) \right) \to J_n \circ_{J_N} (Z) \to J_{n-1} \circ_{J_N} (Z)$$

in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ , natural in all such Z. Noting that the weak equivalence  $\tau_1 J_N \xrightarrow{\simeq} \tau_1 J_1$  induces a weak equivalence of the form

$$i_{n}J_{N} \circ_{\tau_{1}J_{N}}^{\mathsf{h}} \left(\tau_{1}J_{N} \circ_{J_{N}}(Z)\right) \simeq i_{n}J_{N} \circ_{\tau_{1}J_{N}}^{\mathsf{h}} \left(\tau_{1}J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}}(Z)\right)$$
$$\simeq i_{n}J_{N} \circ_{\tau_{1}J_{N}}^{\mathsf{h}} \left(\tau_{1}J_{1} \circ_{J_{1}}J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}}(Z)\right) = F_{n}(Z)$$

completes the proof.

Proof of Theorem 2.12. Consider the commutative diagram of the form

in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ , for each  $(2 \leq n \leq N)$ . We know that the coaugmented cosimplicial diagram in the top horizontal row has extra codegeneracy maps  $s^{-1}$  ([10, 6.2]), since it has the form of a functor  $i_n J_N \circ^\mathsf{h}_{\tau_1 J_N} (\tau_1 J_1 \circ_{J_1} -)$  applied to the coaugmented cosimplicial diagram of the form

$$J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}} (\tilde{X}) \xrightarrow{(\#)_{1}} J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}} (J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}} (\tilde{X})) \Longrightarrow J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}} (J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}} J_{1} \circ_{J_{N}} (\tilde{X})) \Longrightarrow \cdots$$

in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{J_1}$  which has extra code generacy maps  $s^{-1}$  ([10, 6.2]) in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{J_1}$  induced by the map  $J_N \to J_1$ . It follows from cofinality [9, 3.16] that  $\mathsf{holim}_{\Delta}(\#)_1$  and  $\mathsf{holim}_{\Delta}(*)_n$  are weak equivalences for each  $2 \le n \le N$ . Applying  $\mathsf{holim}_{\Delta}$  to (2.11), regarded as a commutative diagram of  $\Delta$ -shaped diagrams

in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}},$  we have a commutative diagram of the form

in  $\operatorname{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$ , with vertical columns homotopy fiber sequences, since homotopy limits commute, up to weak equivalence. Consider diagram (2.12) in the case n=2; then since the top and bottom horizontal maps are weak equivalences, it follows that the middle horizontal map  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(\#)_2$  is a weak equivalence; we are using the fact that every homotopy fiber sequence has an associated long exact sequence in (derived or true) homotopy groups of spectra, together with the five lemma from  $\operatorname{homological}$  algebra (see, for instance, [31, 32]). Hence, by induction up the tower, it follows that  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(\#)_n$  is a weak equivalence for each  $1 \leq n \leq N$ . In particular,  $\operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(\#) = \operatorname{holim}_{\Delta}(\#)_N$  is a weak equivalence, but this is precisely the map  $X \xrightarrow{\simeq} X^{\wedge}_{\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathrm{Nil}_{N+1}}}$  in diagram (2.9), which completes the proof.

Proof of Theorem 1.1. The "only if" direction is trivial since TQ-homology preserves weak equivalences by construction. Conversely, suppose f induces a weak equivalence  $\mathsf{TQ}(X) \simeq \mathsf{TQ}(Y)$  on TQ-homology. Consider the commutative diagram of the form (by Theorem 2.12)

$$X \longrightarrow X_{\mathsf{TQ}}^{\wedge} \longrightarrow X_{\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathsf{Nil}_{M}}}^{\wedge} \stackrel{\simeq}{\longleftarrow} X$$

$$f \downarrow \qquad \simeq \downarrow (\#) \qquad \qquad \downarrow f$$

$$Y \longrightarrow Y_{\mathsf{TQ}}^{\wedge} \longrightarrow Y_{\mathsf{TQ}|_{\mathsf{Nil}_{M}}}^{\wedge} \stackrel{\simeq}{\longleftarrow} Y$$

Since  $\mathsf{TQ}(X) \to \mathsf{TQ}(Y)$  is a weak equivalence, it follows that (#) is a weak equivalence, and hence f is a weak equivalence; this is because diagram (2.13) is a retract diagram by (2.9) after passing to the homotopy category  $\mathsf{Ho}(\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}})$ .

The purpose of the rest of this section is to point out, for completeness, that a similar retract property is also true with TQ-completion replaced by homotopy completion.

**Proposition 2.15.** Let Z be a  $J_N$ -algebra. There are maps of towers of the form

$$\{\tau_n \mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (Z)\}_n \to \{\tau_n J_N \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (Z)\}_n \to \{\tau_n J_N \circ_{J_N} (Z)\}_n$$

natural with respect to Z.

*Proof.* This is because the left-hand map is induced by  $\tau_n \mathcal{O} \to \tau_n J_N$  and the right-hand map is induced by  $\mathcal{O} \to J_N$ .

It follows that there is a commutative diagram of towers

$$\{\tilde{X}\}_n \longrightarrow \{\tau_n \mathcal{O} \circ_{\mathcal{O}} (\tilde{X})\}_n$$

$$\parallel \qquad \qquad \downarrow$$

$$\{\tilde{X}\}_n \longrightarrow \{\tau_n J_N \circ_{J_N} (\tilde{X})\}_n$$

of  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebras, where  $\{\tilde{X}\}_n$  denotes the constant tower with value  $\tilde{X}$ , and applying holim<sub>n</sub> gives the left-hand commutative diagram of the form (2.14).

**Theorem 2.16** (Nilpotent homotopy completion retract theorem). Let  $\mathcal{O}$  be an operad in  $\mathcal{R}$ -modules with  $\mathcal{O}[0] = *$ . Let  $N \geq 1$ . If X is an (N+1)-nilpotent  $\mathcal{O}$ -algebra, then there is a left-hand commutative diagram of the form

in  $\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}}$  with natural map (\*) a weak equivalence. In particular, the homotopy completion map  $X \to X^{\mathsf{h}\wedge}$  fits into the right-hand retract diagram in the homotopy category  $\mathsf{Ho}(\mathsf{Alg}_{\mathcal{O}})$ , natural in X. Here we are assuming that  $\mathcal{O}$  satisfies Assumption 2.1.

*Proof.* It suffices to observe that (\*) is a weak equivalence. This follows from the fact that  $\tilde{X} \xrightarrow{\simeq} \tau_n J_N \circ_{J_N} (\tilde{X})$  is a weak equivalence for each  $n \geq N$ ; this follows from the observation that the map  $J_N \xrightarrow{\simeq} \tau_n J_N$  is a weak equivalence for each  $n \geq N$ .

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
