

THE APRIL MEETING IN NEW YORK

The six hundred thirty-second meeting of the American Mathematical Society was held at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York on April 4–7, 1966. All sessions were held in public rooms of the hotel. About 477 persons attended, including 359 members of the Society.

By invitation of the Committee to Select Hour Speakers for Eastern Sectional Meetings, there were two addresses. Professor Walter Feit of Yale University spoke on Monday on *Modular representations of finite groups*. He was introduced by Professor Wilhelm Magnus. Professor Tsuneo Tamagawa of Yale University addressed the Society on *Z-functions of simple algebras*.

There were eleven sessions for 75 contributed papers on Monday morning and afternoon and on Tuesday morning. Presiding chairmen included Professor Jane Cronin, Dr. A. S. Galbraith, Professors Alex Heller, K. D. Magill, Jr., Dr. Don Mittleman, Professors Marian Pour-El, Elvira Rappaport, W. C. Royster, Arthur Sard, Abraham Schwartz, and A. C. Sugar.

The Association for Symbolic Logic met in the same hotel, also on April 4. Their program included an invited address by Professor Hilary Putnam of Harvard University entitled *Constructive sets and predicative hierarchies*.

There was a Symposium on the Mathematical Aspects of Computer Science in four sessions on Tuesday afternoon, Wednesday, and Thursday morning. It was one in the continuing series sponsored by the Society through its Committee on Applied Mathematics. Sponsorship was shared with the Association for Symbolic Logic and the Association for Computing Machinery. Financial support came from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research and the U. S. Army Research Office—Durham.

The proceedings of the symposium will be published as Volume 18 in the series Proceedings of Symposia in Applied Mathematics under the editorship of Professor Jack Schwartz.
