1. On the Decomposition of Regular Representation of the Lorentz Group on a Hyperboloid of one Sheet

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1. Let G_n be the subgroup of GL(n + 1, R) consisting of elements which leave invariant the quadratic form $-x_0^2 + x_1^2 + \cdots + x_n^2$, and G_n^+ be the connected component of G_n . Let X be the hyperboloid of one sheet in R^{n+1} with the equation $x_0^2 - x_1^2 - \cdots - x_n^2 = -1$. G_n naturally operates on X and the measure on X defined by dx $= \frac{dx_1 \cdots dx_n}{|x_0|}$ is invariant under the action of G_n . Let $L^2(X)$ be the

Hilbert space of functions on X which are square integrable with respect to this measure. Then we get the unitary representation π of G_n^+ on $L^2(X)$ defined as follows: $(\pi(g)f)(x) = f(xg), g \in G_n^+, f \in L^2(X), x \in X$. We denote the corresponding representation of the universal enveloping algebra of Lie algebra of G_n^+ also by π . In this note we decompose π into direct sum of irreducible representations. In the following, we use the notations defined in R. Takahashi [1] Chap. I, §1, §2 without further reference.

2. For any complex number s we define the representations (U^s, \mathcal{H}) of G_n^+ as follows:

Let H be the linear space of C^{\bullet} functions on K which are invariant under left translations of M and $(U^{s}(g)f)(k) = e^{-st(k,g)}f(kg)$, $f \in \mathcal{H}$, where kg and t(k,g) is defined uniquely by the relations $kg = a_{t(k,g)}n kg$, $a_{t(k,g)} \in A$, $n \in N$, and $kg \in K$. In the following for special value of s we define the positive (in general not definite) inner product $(,)_{s}$ in \mathcal{H} so that U_{s} becomes unitary, and we get unitary representation (U_{s}, \mathcal{H}_{s}) where \mathcal{H}_{s} is the completion of \mathcal{H} with respect to the norm $|| \quad ||_{s}$ defined by inner product $(,)_{s}$.

When $s = -\frac{n-1}{2} + i\rho$, $\rho \in R$, we define for any $\varphi, \psi \in \mathcal{H}$, $(\varphi, \psi)_s = \int \varphi \overline{\psi} \, dk$ where dk is the normalized Haar measure of K. For any

The inner product $\langle x, y \rangle$ is defined as $\langle x, y \rangle = x_0 y_0 - x_1 y_1 - \cdots - x_n y_n$ for any two vectors $x = (x_0, x_1, \dots, x_n)$ and $y = (y_0, y_1, \dots, y_n)$. By the analytic continuation regarded as the function of s, $I_s(\varphi, \psi)$ becomes a meromorphic function on the whole s-plane and has simple poles at $s = 0, 1, 2, \cdots$ and it is proved that $I_s(\varphi, \varphi) \ge 0$ for -(n-1) < s < 0 and res. $(-1)^{l-1}I_s(\varphi, \varphi) \ge 0$ for $l = 0, 1, 2, \cdots$. We put $(\varphi, \psi)_s = I_s(\varphi, \psi)$ when -(n-1) < s < 0 and $(\varphi, \psi)_s = \text{res.} (-1)^{l-1}I_s(\varphi, \psi)$ when $s = l = 0, 1, 2, \cdots$. Then it is proved that (U_s, \mathcal{H}_s) (Re s $= -\frac{n-1}{2}$ or -(n-1) < s < 0 or $s = 0, 1, 2, \cdots$) are unitary representations and are irreducible when $n \ne 2$. When n = 2, every (U_i, \mathcal{H}_i) for $l = 0, 1, 2, \cdots$ is decomposed into the direct sum of two irreducible representations and other (U_s, H_s) are irreducible. (For details see Takahashi [1] and Gelfand-Graev-Vielenkin [1].)

3. We denote by $C_{\varepsilon}^{\infty}(X)$ the space of indefinitely differentiable functions on X with compact support. For any $f \in C_{\varepsilon}^{\infty}(X)$ and $s \in C$, $(\operatorname{Re} s > -1)$ we define $\mathcal{F}_{s}^{1}(f)$, $\mathcal{F}_{s}^{2}(f) \in \mathcal{H}$ as follows:

where $v = (1, -1, 0, \dots, 0)$. Then we get the following.

Lemma. a) For any fixed $k \in K$, $\mathcal{F}_{s}^{i}(k)$ (i=1,2) is continued to a meromorphic function on the whole s-plane which has simple poles at $s=-1, -2, \cdots$.

b) For a fixed $s \ (s \neq -1, -2, \cdots)$ $\mathcal{F}_{s}^{i}(\pi(g)f) = U_{s}(g)F_{s}^{i}(f), \ i=1, 2, \ g \in G_{n}^{+}.$

c) Let res. $\mathcal{F}_{s}(f)$ be the element of \mathcal{H} defined by $(\operatorname{res}_{s=-j} \mathcal{F}_{s}(f))(k) = \operatorname{res.}_{s=-i} (\mathcal{F}_{s}(f)(k))$, then

Then we have the following.

Theorem 1. 4. Let $\Delta = -\pi(\Omega)$, where Ω is defined in R. Takahashi [1] p. 327. Δ is the Casimir operators on X which is known to be essentially self-adjoint on $L^2(X)$. Let $P_0 = (0, 1, \dots, 0) \in X$, G_{n-1} be the subgroup of G_n consisting of elements which leave invariant the point p_0 , and let $X' = \{x \in X, x_2 \neq \pm 1\}$.

Our proof of theorem 1 depends on the following two theorems. Theorem 2. A. For any $\lambda \in C(\operatorname{Im} \lambda \neq 0)$ there is a unique distribution T_{λ} on X satisfying the following three conditions. 1. T_{λ} is invariant under G_{n-1} that is, $T_{\lambda}(\pi(g)f) = T_{\lambda}(f)$ for any $g \in G_{n-1}, f \in C_{c}^{\infty}(X)$. 2. $(\Delta - \lambda)T_{\lambda} = \delta(p_{0}) (\delta(p_{0})$ is the Dirac measure concentrated to p_{0}) 3. When we put $s = \frac{n-1+\sqrt{(n-1)^{2}+4\lambda}}{2}$ (square root is taken so that its real part is positive) $\limsup_{\substack{|x_{2}|\to\infty\\|x_{2}|\to\infty}} ||x_{2}|^{s}T_{\lambda}| < \infty$ (It is proved that, T_{λ} , satisfying conditions 1, 2, coincides in X' with analytic function depending only on x_{2} .)

B. $(\Delta - \lambda)^{-1}$, resolvent of Δ , is expressed by T_{λ} as follows: $((\Delta - \lambda)^{-1}f)(x) = T_{\lambda}(\pi_{(g_x)}f), x \in X, f \in C_{\sigma}^{\infty}(X).$

Here g_x is any element in G_n such that $p_0g_x=x$.

Let F(x) be a function defined on X^- such that for any $\varphi \in C_{\sigma}^{\infty}(X)$ the integral $F(\varphi, s) = \int F(x)\varphi(x) |x_2^2 - 1|^s dx$ converges absolutely for s whose real part is sufficiently large, and $F(\varphi, s)$, as a function of s can be continued analytically to the neighbourhood of s=0 and at s=0 has Laurent expansion

Theorem 3. The distribution T_{λ} , defined in Theorem 2 has the following expression:

When we substitute the expression of $(\Delta - \lambda)^{-1}$ obtained by Theorems 2 and 3 to the well-known formula No. 1] Decomposition of Regular Representation of Lorentz Group etc.

we get Theorem 1.

The detailed proof of this note will appear elsewhere. When n=3, our problem is solved with different method by Gelfand-Graev [1] in more refined form (see also Gelfand-Graev-Vielenkin [1]).
