THE NOVEMBER MEETING IN EVANSTON

The six hundred eighteenth meeting of the American Mathematical Society was held at Northwestern University on Friday and Saturday, November 27–28, 1964. Meeting headquarters were at the North Shore Hotel in Evanston, Illinois, though registration and all the scientific sessions of the meeting were held at the Technological Institute Building. There were 198 registrants, 180 of whom were members of the Society.

By invitation of the Committee to Select Hour Speakers for Western Sectional Meetings, Professor James Serrin addressed the Society on *Multiple integral problems in the calculus of variations*. The talk was given in Lecture Room 3 of the Technological Institute Building at 2:00 P.M., Friday. Professor J. A. Nohel presided.

There was a special session of 20 minute papers on "Recent developments in ring theory," on Saturday morning. Professor I. N. Herstein arranged that session.

Sessions for the presentation of contributed papers were held at 3:15 P.M. on Friday and at 9:30 A.M. on Saturday. Presiding officers were Professors L. Evens, J. G. Hocking, and G. M. Leibowitz. Papers 618-2, 14, 25 were not presented in person.

Members of the Society were entertained at tea on Friday afternoon by the ladies of the Department of Mathematics at Northwestern University.
