Hybrid Iterative Scheme for Triple Hierarchical Variational Inequalities with Mixed Equilibrium, Variational Inclusion, and Minimization Constraints

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We introduce and analyze a hybrid iterative algorithm by combining Korpelevich's extragradient method, the hybrid steepest-descent method, and the averaged mapping approach to the gradient-projection algorithm. It is proven that, under appropriate assumptions, the proposed algorithm converges strongly to a common element of the fixed point set of finitely many nonexpansive mappings, the solution set of a generalized mixed equilibrium problem (GMEP), the solution set of finitely many variational inclusions, and the solution set of a convex minimization problem (CMP), which is also a unique solution of a triple hierarchical variational inequality (THVI) in a real Hilbert space. In addition, we also consider the application of the proposed algorithm to solving a hierarchical variational inequality problem with constraints of the GMEP, the CMP, and finitely many variational inclusions.

1. Introduction

Let H be a real Hilbert space with inner product $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle$ and norm $\| \cdot \|$, let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of H , and let P_C be the metric projection of H onto C . Let $S : C \rightarrow H$ be a nonlinear mapping on C . We denote by $\text{Fix}(S)$ the set of fixed points of S and by \mathbf{R} the set of all real numbers. A mapping $S : C \rightarrow H$ is called L -Lipschitz continuous if there exists a constant $L > 0$ such that

$$\|Sx - Sy\| \leq L \|x - y\|, \quad \forall x, y \in C. \quad (1)$$

In particular, if $L = 1$ then S is called a nonexpansive mapping; if $L \in (0, 1)$ then S is called a contraction.

Let $A : C \rightarrow H$ be a nonlinear mapping on C . We consider the following variational inequality problem (VIP) [1]: find a point $x \in C$ such that

$$\langle Ax, y - x \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (2)$$

The solution set of VIP (2) is denoted by $\text{VI}(C, A)$.

Let $\varphi : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a real-valued function, let $A : H \rightarrow H$ be a nonlinear mapping, and let $\Theta : C \times C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a bifunction. The generalized mixed equilibrium problem (GMEP) [2] is to find $x \in C$ such that

$$\Theta(x, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(x) + \langle Ax, y - x \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \quad (3)$$

We denote the set of solutions of GMEP (3) by $\text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A)$.

In [2], it is assumed that $\Theta : C \times C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is a bifunction satisfying conditions (H1)–(H4) and $\varphi : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is a lower

semicontinuous and convex function with restriction (A1) or (A2), where

- (H1) $\Theta(x, x) = 0$, for all $x \in C$;
 (H2) Θ is monotone; that is, $\Theta(x, y) + \Theta(y, x) \leq 0$, for any $x, y \in C$;
 (H3) Θ is upper-hemicontinuous; that is, for each $x, y, z \in C$,

$$\limsup_{t \rightarrow 0^+} \Theta(tz + (1-t)x, y) \leq \Theta(x, y); \quad (4)$$

- (H4) $\Theta(x, \cdot)$ is convex and lower semicontinuous, for each $x \in C$;
 (A1) for each $x \in H$ and $r > 0$, there exists a bounded subset $D_x \subset C$ and $y_x \in C$ such that, for any $z \in C \setminus D_x$,

$$\Theta(z, y_x) + \varphi(y_x) - \varphi(z) + \frac{1}{r} \langle y_x - z, z - x \rangle < 0; \quad (5)$$

- (A2) C is a bounded set.

Given a positive number $r > 0$, let $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)} : H \rightarrow C$ be the solution set of the auxiliary mixed equilibrium problem; that is, for each $x \in H$,

$$\begin{aligned} S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(x) &:= \left\{ y \in C : \Theta(y, z) + \varphi(z) - \varphi(y) \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \frac{1}{r} \langle K'(y) - K'(x), z - y \rangle \geq 0, \forall z \in C \right\}, \end{aligned} \quad (6)$$

where K is a Fréchet differential and strongly convex function on H . In particular, whenever $K(x) = (1/2)\|x\|^2, \forall x \in H$, $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is rewritten as $T_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$.

Let $f : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a convex and continuously Fréchet differentiable functional. Consider the convex minimization problem (CMP) of minimizing f over the constraint set C :

$$\min_{x \in C} f(x) \quad (7)$$

(assuming the existence of minimizers). We denote by Γ the set of minimizers of CMP (7).

In 2011, combining the hybrid steepest-descent method in [3], the viscosity approximation method, and averaged mapping approach to the gradient-projection algorithm (GPA) in [4], Ceng et al. [5] introduced and analyzed the following iterative algorithm:

$$x_{n+1} = P_C [s_n \gamma V x_n + (I - s_n \mu F) T_n x_n], \quad \forall n \geq 0, \quad (8)$$

where $V : C \rightarrow H$ is l -Lipschitzian mapping with constant $l \geq 0$ and $F : C \rightarrow H$ is a κ -Lipschitzian and η -strongly monotone operator with constants $\kappa, \eta > 0$. Assume that $0 < \mu < 2\eta/\kappa^2, 0 \leq \gamma l < \tau = 1 - \sqrt{1 - \mu(2\eta - \mu\kappa^2)}, s_n := s_n(\lambda_n) = (2 - \lambda_n L)/4$ with $\{\lambda_n\} \subset (0, 2/L)$ and $\lambda_n \rightarrow 2/L$,

and $P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) = s_n I + (1 - s_n) T_n$. Under the control conditions that (i) $s_n \rightarrow 0$, (ii) $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} s_n = \infty$, (iii) either $\sum_{n=0}^{\infty} |s_{n+1} - s_n| < \infty$ or $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} s_{n+1}/s_n = 1$, it was proven in [5] that the sequence $\{x_n\}$ generated by (8) converges strongly to some $x^* \in \Gamma$, which is a unique solution of the VIP

$$\langle (\mu F - \gamma V) x^*, p - x^* \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in \Gamma. \quad (9)$$

On the other hand, let B be a single-valued mapping of C into H and let R be a set-valued mapping with $D(R) = C$. Consider the following variational inclusion: find a point $x \in C$ such that

$$0 \in Bx + Rx. \quad (10)$$

We denote by $I(B, R)$ the solution set of the variational inclusion (10). Let a set-valued mapping $R : D(R) \subset H \rightarrow 2^H$ be maximal monotone. We define the resolvent operator $J_{R, \lambda} : H \rightarrow \overline{D(R)}$ associated with R and λ as follows:

$$J_{R, \lambda} = (I + \lambda R)^{-1}, \quad \forall x \in H, \quad (11)$$

where λ is a positive number.

Let S and T be two nonexpansive mappings. In 2009, Yao et al. [6] considered the following hierarchical VIP: find hierarchically a fixed point of T , which is a solution to the VIP for monotone mapping $I - S$; namely, find $\tilde{x} \in \text{Fix}(T)$ such that

$$\langle (I - S) \tilde{x}, p - \tilde{x} \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in \text{Fix}(T). \quad (12)$$

The solution set of the hierarchical VIP (12) is denoted by Λ . It is not hard to check that solving the hierarchical VIP (12) is equivalent to solving fixed point problem of the composite mapping $P_{\text{Fix}(T)} S$; that is, find $\tilde{x} \in C$ such that $\tilde{x} = P_{\text{Fix}(T)} S \tilde{x}$. The authors [6] introduced and analyzed the following iterative algorithm for solving the hierarchical VIP (12):

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= \beta_n S x_n + (1 - \beta_n) x_n, \\ x_{n+1} &= \alpha_n V x_n + (1 - \alpha_n) T y_n, \quad \forall n \geq 0. \end{aligned} \quad (13)$$

We observed that Zeng et al. [7] introduced and considered the following triple hierarchical variational inequality (THVI).

Problem 1. Let N be a positive integer. Assume that

- (i) each $S_i : H \rightarrow H$ is a nonexpansive mapping with $\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \neq \emptyset$;
- (ii) $A_1 : H \rightarrow H$ is α -inverse strongly monotone;
- (iii) $A_2 : H \rightarrow H$ is β -strongly monotone and κ -Lipschitz continuous;
- (iv) $\text{IV}(\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i), A_1) \neq \emptyset$.

Then, the objective is to

$$\begin{aligned} \text{find } x^* \in \text{VI} \left(\text{VI} \left(\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i), A_1 \right), A_2 \right) \\ := \left\{ x^* \in \text{VI} \left(\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i), A_1 \right) : \langle A_2 x^*, v - x^* \rangle \geq 0, \right. \\ \left. \forall v \in \text{VI} \left(\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i), A_1 \right) \right\}. \end{aligned} \tag{14}$$

The authors [7] proposed the following algorithm for solving Problem 1.

Algorithm ZWY (see [7, Algorithm 3.2]). Let $S_i : H \rightarrow H$ ($i = 1, 2, \dots, N$) and $A_j : H \rightarrow H$ ($j = 1, 2$) satisfy assumptions (i)–(iv) in Problem 1. The following steps are presented for solving Problem 1.

Step 0. Take $\{\alpha_n\}_{n=0}^\infty \subset (0, 1]$, $\{\rho_n\}_{n=0}^\infty \subset (0, 2\alpha]$, $\mu \in (0, 2\beta/\kappa^2)$, choose $x_0 \in H$ arbitrarily, and let $n := 0$.

Step 1. Given $x_n \in H$, compute $x_{n+1} \in H$ as

$$\begin{aligned} y_n &= S_{[n+1]}(x_n - \rho_n A_1 x_n), \\ x_{n+1} &= y_n - \mu \alpha_n A_2 y_n, \end{aligned} \tag{15}$$

where $S_{[k]} := S_{k \bmod N}$, for integer $k \geq 1$, with the mod function taking values in the set $\{1, 2, \dots, N\}$; that is, if $k = jN + q$ for some integers $j \geq 0$ and $0 \leq q < N$, then $S_{[k]} = S_N$ if $q = 0$ and $S_{[k]} = S_q$ if $1 \leq q < N$.

Update $n := n + 1$ and go to Step 1.

In this paper, we introduce and study the following triple hierarchical variational inequality (THVI) with constraints of GMEP (3), CMP (7), and finitely many variational inclusions.

Problem 2. Let M, N be two positive integers. Assume that

- (i) $S_i : H \rightarrow H$ is a nonexpansive mapping, for $i = 1, 2, \dots, N$, $A : H \rightarrow H$ is ζ -inverse strongly monotone, and $f : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is a convex functional with L -Lipschitz continuous gradient ∇f ;
- (ii) $\widetilde{A}_1 : H \rightarrow H$ is α -inverse strongly monotone and $\widetilde{A}_2 : H \rightarrow H$ is β -strongly monotone and κ -Lipschitz continuous;
- (iii) Θ is a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbf{R} satisfying (H1)–(H4) and $\varphi : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is a lower semicontinuous and convex functional;
- (iv) $R_k : C \rightarrow 2^H$ is a maximal monotone mapping and $B_k : C \rightarrow H$ is η_k -inverse strongly monotone for $k = 1, 2, \dots, M$;
- (v) $\text{VI}(\Omega, \widetilde{A}_1) \neq \emptyset$, where $\Omega := \bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \cap (\bigcap_{k=1}^M I(B_k, R_k)) \cap \Gamma$.

Then, the objective is to

$$\begin{aligned} \text{find } x^* \in \text{VI}(\text{VI}(\Omega, \widetilde{A}_1), \widetilde{A}_2) \\ := \{x^* \in \text{VI}(\Omega, \widetilde{A}_1) : \langle \widetilde{A}_2 x^*, v - x^* \rangle \geq 0, \\ \forall v \in \text{VI}(\Omega, \widetilde{A}_1)\}. \end{aligned} \tag{16}$$

Motivated and inspired by the above facts, we introduce and analyze a hybrid iterative algorithm by combining Korpelevich's extragradient method, the hybrid steepest-descent method, and the averaged mapping approach to the gradient-projection algorithm. It is proven that under mild conditions, the proposed algorithm converges strongly to a common element $x^* \in \Omega := (\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i)) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \cap (\bigcap_{k=1}^M I(B_k, R_k)) \cap \Gamma$ of the solution set of GMEP (3), the solution set of CMP (7), the solution set of finitely many variational inclusions, and the fixed point set of finitely many nonexpansive mappings $\{S_i\}_{i=1}^N$, which is merely a unique solution of the THVI (16). In addition, we also consider the application of the proposed algorithm to solving a hierarchical variational inequality problem with constraints of GMEP (3), CMP (7), and finitely many variational inclusions. That is, under appropriate conditions, it is proven that the proposed algorithm converges strongly to a unique solution $u^* \in \Omega$ of the VIP: $\langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, p - u^* \rangle \geq 0, \forall p \in \Omega$; equivalently, $P_\Omega(I - \widetilde{A}_2)u^* = u^*$. The results obtained in this paper improve and extend the corresponding results announced by many others. We also observe that some recent and related results have been established in [8–14].

2. Preliminaries

Throughout this paper, we assume that H is a real Hilbert space whose inner product and norm are denoted by $\langle \cdot, \cdot \rangle$ and $\|\cdot\|$, respectively. Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of H . We write $x_n \rightharpoonup x$ to indicate that the sequence $\{x_n\}$ converges weakly to x and $x_n \rightarrow x$ to indicate that the sequence $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to x . Moreover, we use $\omega_w(x_n)$ to denote the weak ω -limit set of the sequence $\{x_n\}$; that is,

$$\begin{aligned} \omega_w(x_n) &:= \{x \in H : x_{n_i} \rightharpoonup x \\ &\text{for some subsequence } \{x_{n_i}\} \text{ of } \{x_n\}\}. \end{aligned} \tag{17}$$

Definition 3. A mapping $A : C \rightarrow H$ is called

- (i) monotone if $\langle Ax - Ay, x - y \rangle \geq 0, \forall x, y \in C;$ (18)

- (ii) η -strongly monotone if there exists a constant $\eta > 0$ such that

$$\langle Ax - Ay, x - y \rangle \geq \eta \|x - y\|^2, \quad \forall x, y \in C; \tag{19}$$

- (iii) ζ -inverse strongly monotone if there exists a constant $\zeta > 0$ such that

$$\langle Ax - Ay, x - y \rangle \geq \zeta \|Ax - Ay\|^2, \quad \forall x, y \in C. \tag{20}$$

It is obvious that if A is ζ -inverse strongly monotone, then A is monotone and $1/\zeta$ -Lipschitz continuous. Moreover, we also have that, for all $u, v \in C$ and $\lambda > 0$,

$$\begin{aligned} & \|(I - \lambda A)u - (I - \lambda A)v\|^2 \\ & \leq \|u - v\|^2 + \lambda(\lambda - 2\zeta)\|Au - Av\|^2. \end{aligned} \quad (21)$$

So, if $\lambda \leq 2\zeta$, then $I - \lambda A$ is a nonexpansive mapping from C to H .

Definition 4. A differentiable function $K : H \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is called

(i) convex, if

$$K(y) - K(x) \geq \langle K'(x), y - x \rangle, \quad \forall x, y \in H, \quad (22)$$

where $K'(x)$ is the Frechet derivative of K at x ;

(ii) strongly convex, if there exists a constant $\sigma > 0$ such that

$$K(y) - K(x) - \langle K'(x), y - x \rangle \geq \frac{\sigma}{2}\|x - y\|^2, \quad \forall x, y \in H. \quad (23)$$

It is easy to see that if $K : H \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is a differentiable strongly convex function with a constant $\sigma > 0$ then $K' : H \rightarrow H$ is strongly monotone with constant $\sigma > 0$.

The metric projection from H onto C is the mapping $P_C : H \rightarrow C$ which assigns to each point $x \in H$ the unique point $P_C x \in C$ satisfying the property

$$\|x - P_C x\| = \inf_{y \in C} \|x - y\| =: d(x, C). \quad (24)$$

Some important properties of projections are gathered in the following proposition.

Proposition 5. For given $x \in H$ and $z \in C$:

- (i) $z = P_C x \Leftrightarrow \langle x - z, y - z \rangle \leq 0, \forall y \in C$;
- (ii) $z = P_C x \Leftrightarrow \|x - z\|^2 \leq \|x - y\|^2 - \|y - z\|^2, \forall y \in C$;
- (iii) $\langle P_C x - P_C y, x - y \rangle \geq \|P_C x - P_C y\|^2, \forall y \in H$ (this implies that P_C is nonexpansive and monotone).

By using the technique of [15], we can readily obtain the following elementary result, where $\text{MEP}(\Theta, \varphi)$ is the solution set of the mixed equilibrium problem [15].

Proposition 6 (see [16, Lemma 1 and Proposition 1]). Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a real Hilbert space H and let $\varphi : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a lower semicontinuous and convex function. Let $\Theta : C \times C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a bifunction satisfying the conditions (H1)–(H4). Assume that

- (i) $K : H \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is strongly convex with constant $\sigma > 0$ and the function $x \mapsto \langle y - x, K'(x) \rangle$ is weakly upper semicontinuous, for each $y \in H$;

- (ii) for each $x \in H$ and $r > 0$ there exists a bounded subset $D_x \subset C$ and $y_x \in C$ such that, for any $z \in C \setminus D_x$,

$$\Theta(z, y_x) + \varphi(y_x) - \varphi(z) + \frac{1}{r} \langle K'(z) - K'(x), y_x - z \rangle < 0. \quad (25)$$

Then, the following hold:

- (a) for each $x \in H, S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(x) \neq \emptyset$;
- (b) $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is single-valued;
- (c) $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is nonexpansive if K' is Lipschitz continuous with constant $\nu > 0$ and

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle K'(x_1) - K'(x_2), u_1 - u_2 \rangle \\ & \leq \langle K'(u_1) - K'(u_2), u_1 - u_2 \rangle, \quad \forall (x_1, x_2) \in H \times H, \end{aligned} \quad (26)$$

where $u_i = S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(x_i)$, for $i = 1, 2$;

- (d) for all $s, t > 0$ and $x \in H$,

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle K'(S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x) - K'(S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x), S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x \rangle \\ & \leq \frac{s-t}{s} \langle K'(S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x) - K'(x), S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x \rangle; \end{aligned} \quad (27)$$

- (e) $\text{Fix}(S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}) = \text{MEP}(\Theta, \varphi)$;

- (f) $\text{MEP}(\Theta, \varphi)$ is closed and convex.

In particular, whenever $\Theta : C \times C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is a bifunction satisfying the conditions (H1)–(H4) and $K(x) = (1/2)\|x\|^2, \forall x \in H$, then we have that $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is firmly nonexpansive and

$$\begin{aligned} & \|S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x\| \leq \frac{|s-t|}{s} \|S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - x\|, \\ & \forall s, t > 0, \quad x \in H. \end{aligned} \quad (28)$$

In this case, $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is rewritten as $T_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$. If, in addition, $\varphi \equiv 0$, then $T_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is rewritten as T_r^Θ (see [17, Lemma 2.1] for more details).

Remark 7. Suppose that $K : H \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is strongly convex with constant $\sigma > 0$ and $K' : H \rightarrow H$ is Lipschitz continuous with constant $\nu > 0$. Then, $K' : H \rightarrow H$ is σ -strongly monotone and ν -Lipschitz continuous with positive constants $\sigma, \nu > 0$. Utilizing Proposition 6 (d) we obtain that, for all $s, t > 0$ and $x \in H$,

$$\begin{aligned} & \sigma \|S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x\|^2 \\ & \leq \langle K'(S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x) - K'(S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x), S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x \rangle \\ & \leq \frac{s-t}{s} \langle K'(S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x) - K'(x), S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x \rangle \\ & \leq \frac{|s-t|}{s} \|K'(S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x) - K'(x)\| \|S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x\| \\ & \leq \frac{|s-t|}{s} \nu \|S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - x\| \|S_s^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x - S_t^{(\Theta, \varphi)} x\|, \end{aligned} \quad (29)$$

which immediately implies that

$$\|S_s^{(\Theta,\varphi)}x - S_t^{(\Theta,\varphi)}x\| \leq \frac{|s-t|}{s} \cdot \frac{\gamma}{\sigma} \|S_s^{(\Theta,\varphi)}x - x\|. \tag{30}$$

The concept of W -mapping was introduced in Atsushiba and Takahashi [18]. It is very useful in establishing the convergence of iterative methods for computing a common fixed point of nonlinear mappings (see, for instance, [19, 20]).

Let $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n} \in (0, 1], n \geq 1$. Given the nonexpansive mappings S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N on C , Atsushiba and Takahashi define, for each $n \geq 1$, mappings $U_{1,n}, U_{2,n}, \dots, U_{N,n}$ by

$$\begin{aligned} U_{1,n} &= \mu_{1,n}S_1 + (1 - \mu_{1,n})I, \\ U_{2,n} &= \mu_{2,n}S_2 + (1 - \mu_{2,n})I, \\ &\vdots \\ U_{N-1,n} &= \mu_{N-1,n}S_{N-1}U_{N-2,n} + (1 - \mu_{N-1,n})I, \\ W_n &:= U_{N,n} = \mu_{N,n}S_NU_{N-1,n} + (1 - \mu_{N,n})I. \end{aligned} \tag{31}$$

The W_n is called the W -mapping generated by S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n}$. Note that the nonexpansivity of S_i implies the one of W_n .

Proposition 8 (see [20]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a Banach space X . Let S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N be a finite family of nonexpansive mappings of C into itself such that $\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \neq \emptyset$, and let $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n}$ be real numbers such that $0 < \mu_{i,n} \leq b < 1$ for $i = 1, 2, \dots, N$. For any $n \geq 1$, let W_n be the W -mapping of C into itself generated by S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n}$. If X is strictly convex, then $\text{Fix}(W_n) = \bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i)$.*

Proposition 9 (see [21, Lemma 2.8]). *Let C be a nonempty convex subset of a Banach space X . Let $\{S_i\}_{i=1}^N$ be a finite family of nonexpansive mappings of C into itself and let $\{\mu_{i,n}\}_{i=1}^N$ be sequences in $[0, 1]$ such that $\mu_{i,n} \rightarrow \mu_i$ ($i = 1, 2, \dots, N$). Moreover, for every integer $n \geq 1$, let W and W_n be the W -mapping generated by S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_1, \mu_2, \dots, \mu_N$ and S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n}$ respectively. Then, for every $x \in C$, it follows that*

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|W_nx - Wx\| = 0. \tag{32}$$

In what follows, we recall some facts and tools in a real Hilbert space H .

Lemma 10. *Let X be a real inner product space. Then, the following inequality holds:*

$$\|x + y\|^2 \leq \|x\|^2 + 2 \langle y, x + y \rangle, \quad \forall x, y \in X. \tag{33}$$

Lemma 11. *Let H be a real Hilbert space. Then, the following hold:*

- (a) $\|x - y\|^2 = \|x\|^2 - \|y\|^2 - 2 \langle x - y, y \rangle$, for all $x, y \in H$;
- (b) $\|\lambda x + \mu y\|^2 = \lambda \|x\|^2 + \mu \|y\|^2 - \lambda \mu \|x - y\|^2$, for all $x, y \in H$ and $\lambda, \mu \in [0, 1]$ with $\lambda + \mu = 1$;

(c) *If $\{x_n\}$ is a sequence in H such that $x_n \rightarrow x$, it follows that*

$$\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - y\|^2 = \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - x\|^2 + \|x - y\|^2, \quad \forall y \in H. \tag{34}$$

Definition 12. A mapping $T : H \rightarrow H$ is said to be an averaged mapping if it can be written as the average of the identity I and a nonexpansive mapping; that is,

$$T \equiv (1 - \alpha)I + \alpha S, \tag{35}$$

where $\alpha \in (0, 1)$ and $S : H \rightarrow H$ is nonexpansive. More precisely, when the last equality holds, we say that T is α -averaged. Thus, firmly nonexpansive mappings (in particular, projections) are $1/2$ -averaged mappings.

Lemma 13 (see [22]). *Let $T : H \rightarrow H$ be a given mapping.*

- (i) *T is nonexpansive if and only if the complement $I - T$ is $1/2$ -ism.*
- (ii) *If T is ν -ism, then, for $\gamma > 0$, γT is ν/γ -ism.*
- (iii) *T is averaged if and only if the complement $I - T$ is ν -ism for some $\nu > 1/2$. Indeed, for $\alpha \in (0, 1)$, T is α -averaged if and only if $I - T$ is $1/2\alpha$ -ism.*

Lemma 14 (see [22]). *Let $S, T, V : H \rightarrow H$ be given operators.*

- (i) *If $T = (1 - \alpha)S + \alpha V$ for some $\alpha \in (0, 1)$ and if S is averaged and V is nonexpansive, then T is averaged.*
- (ii) *T is firmly nonexpansive if and only if the complement $I - T$ is firmly nonexpansive.*
- (iii) *If $T = (1 - \alpha)S + \alpha V$ for some $\alpha \in (0, 1)$ and if S is firmly nonexpansive and V is nonexpansive, then T is averaged.*
- (iv) *The composite of finitely many averaged mappings is averaged. That is, if each of the mappings $\{T_i\}_{i=1}^N$ is averaged, then so is the composite $T_1 \cdots T_N$. In particular, if T_1 is α_1 -averaged and T_2 is α_2 -averaged, where $\alpha_1, \alpha_2 \in (0, 1)$, then the composite T_1T_2 is α -averaged, where $\alpha = \alpha_1 + \alpha_2 - \alpha_1\alpha_2$.*
- (v) *If the mappings $\{T_i\}_{i=1}^N$ are averaged and have a common fixed point, then*

$$\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(T_i) = \text{Fix}(T_1T_2 \cdots T_N). \tag{36}$$

The notation $\text{Fix}(T)$ denotes the set of all fixed points of the mapping T ; that is, $\text{Fix}(T) = \{x \in H : Tx = x\}$.

Let $f : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a convex functional with L -Lipschitz continuous gradient ∇f . It is well known that the gradient-projection algorithm (GPA) generates a sequence $\{x_n\}$ determined by the gradient ∇f and the metric projection P_C :

$$x_{n+1} := P_C(x_n - \lambda \nabla f(x_n)), \quad \forall n \geq 0, \tag{37}$$

or, more generally,

$$x_{n+1} := P_C(x_n - \lambda_n \nabla f(x_n)), \quad \forall n \geq 0, \quad (38)$$

where, in both (37) and (38), the initial guess x_0 is taken from C arbitrarily and the parameters λ or λ_n are positive real numbers. The convergence of algorithms (37) and (38) depends on the behavior of the gradient ∇f .

Lemma 15 (see [23, demiclosedness principle]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a real Hilbert space H . Let T be a nonexpansive self-mapping on C . Then, $I - T$ is demiclosed. That is, whenever $\{x_n\}$ is a sequence in C weakly converging to some $x \in C$ and the sequence $\{(I - T)x_n\}$ strongly converges to some y , it follows that $(I - T)x = y$. Here I is the identity operator of H .*

Lemma 16. *Let $A : C \rightarrow H$ be a monotone mapping. In the context of the variational inequality problem the characterization of the projection (see Proposition 5 (i)) implies*

$$u \in \text{VI}(C, A) \iff u = P_C(u - \lambda Au), \quad \lambda > 0. \quad (39)$$

Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a real Hilbert space H . We introduce some notations. Let λ be a number in $(0, 1]$ and let $\mu > 0$. Associating with a nonexpansive mapping $T : C \rightarrow H$, we define the mapping $T^\lambda : C \rightarrow H$ by

$$T^\lambda x := Tx - \lambda \mu F(Tx), \quad \forall x \in C, \quad (40)$$

where $F : H \rightarrow H$ is an operator such that, for some positive constants $\kappa, \eta > 0$, F is κ -Lipschitzian and η -strongly monotone on H ; that is, F satisfies the conditions

$$\|Fx - Fy\| \leq \kappa \|x - y\|, \quad \langle Fx - Fy, x - y \rangle \geq \eta \|x - y\|^2 \quad (41)$$

for all $x, y \in H$.

Lemma 17 (see [3, Lemma 3.1]). *T^λ is a contraction provided $0 < \mu < 2\eta/\kappa^2$; that is,*

$$\|T^\lambda x - T^\lambda y\| \leq (1 - \lambda\tau) \|x - y\|, \quad \forall x, y \in C, \quad (42)$$

where $\tau = 1 - \sqrt{1 - \mu(2\eta - \mu\kappa^2)} \in (0, 1]$.

Lemma 18 (see [3]). *Let $\{s_n\}$ be a sequence of nonnegative numbers satisfying the conditions*

$$s_{n+1} \leq (1 - \alpha_n) s_n + \alpha_n \beta_n, \quad \forall n \geq 1, \quad (43)$$

where $\{\alpha_n\}$ and $\{\beta_n\}$ are sequences of real numbers such that

(i) $\{\alpha_n\} \subset [0, 1]$ and $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \alpha_n = \infty$ or, equivalently,

$$\prod_{n=1}^{\infty} (1 - \alpha_n) := \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \prod_{k=1}^n (1 - \alpha_k) = 0; \quad (44)$$

(ii) $\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \beta_n \leq 0$, or $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} |\alpha_n \beta_n| < \infty$.

Then, $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} s_n = 0$.

Recall that a Banach space X is said to satisfy Opial's property [23] if for any given sequence $\{x_n\} \subset X$ which converges weakly to an element $x \in X$, there holds the inequality

$$\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - x\| < \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - y\|, \quad \forall y \in X, y \neq x. \quad (45)$$

It is well known that every Hilbert space H satisfies Opial's property in [23].

Finally, recall that a set-valued mapping $T : D(T) \subset H \rightarrow 2^H$ is called monotone if for all $x, y \in D(T)$, $f \in Tx$ and $g \in Ty$ imply

$$\langle f - g, x - y \rangle \geq 0. \quad (46)$$

A set-valued mapping T is called maximal monotone if T is monotone and $(I + \lambda T)D(T) = H$, for each $\lambda > 0$, where I is the identity mapping of H . We denote by $G(T)$ the graph of T . It is known that a monotone mapping T is maximal if and only if, for $(x, f) \in H \times H$, $\langle f - g, x - y \rangle \geq 0$ for every $(y, g) \in G(T)$ implies $f \in Tx$. Let $A : C \rightarrow H$ be a monotone, k -Lipschitz-continuous mapping, and let $N_C v$ be the normal cone to C at $v \in C$; that is,

$$N_C v = \{u \in H : \langle v - p, u \rangle \geq 0, \forall p \in C\}. \quad (47)$$

Define

$$\tilde{T}v = \begin{cases} Av + N_C v, & \text{if } v \in C, \\ \emptyset, & \text{if } v \notin C. \end{cases} \quad (48)$$

Then, \tilde{T} is maximal monotone and

$$0 \in \tilde{T}v \iff v \in \text{VI}(C, A). \quad (49)$$

Let $R : D(R) \subset H \rightarrow 2^H$ be a maximal monotone mapping. Let $\lambda, \mu > 0$ be two positive numbers.

Lemma 19 (see [24]). *There holds the resolvent identity*

$$J_{R,\lambda} x = J_{R,\mu} \left(\frac{\mu}{\lambda} x + \left(1 - \frac{\mu}{\lambda}\right) J_{R,\lambda} x \right), \quad \forall x \in H. \quad (50)$$

For $\lambda, \mu > 0$, we observe that there holds the following relation:

$$\begin{aligned} \|J_{R,\lambda} x - J_{R,\mu} y\| &\leq \|x - y\| \\ &+ |\lambda - \mu| \left(\frac{1}{\lambda} \|J_{R,\lambda} x - y\| + \frac{1}{\mu} \|x - J_{R,\mu} y\| \right), \quad \forall x, y \in H. \end{aligned} \quad (51)$$

Lemma 20 (see [25]). *$J_{R,\lambda}$ is single-valued and firmly nonexpansive; that is,*

$$\langle J_{R,\lambda} x - J_{R,\lambda} y, x - y \rangle \geq \|J_{R,\lambda} x - J_{R,\lambda} y\|^2, \quad \forall x, y \in H. \quad (52)$$

Consequently, $J_{R,\lambda}$ is nonexpansive and monotone.

Lemma 21 (see [26]). *Let R be a maximal monotone mapping with $D(R) = C$. Then, for any given $\lambda > 0$, $u \in C$ is a solution of problem (11) if and only if $u \in C$ satisfies*

$$u = J_{R,\lambda}(u - \lambda Bu). \tag{53}$$

Lemma 22 (see [27]). *Let R be a maximal monotone mapping with $D(R) = C$ and let $B : C \rightarrow H$ be a strongly monotone, continuous, and single-valued mapping. Then, for each $z \in H$, the equation $z \in (B + \lambda R)x$ has a unique solution x_λ for $\lambda > 0$.*

Lemma 23 (see [26]). *Let R be a maximal monotone mapping with $D(R) = C$ and let $B : C \rightarrow H$ be a monotone, continuous, and single-valued mapping. Then, $(I + \lambda(R + B))C = H$ for each $\lambda > 0$. In this case, $R + B$ is maximal monotone.*

3. Main Results

In this section, we will introduce and analyze a hybrid iterative algorithm for finding a solution of the THVI (16) with constraints of several problems: the GMEP (3), the CMP (7), and finitely many variational inclusions in a real Hilbert space. This algorithm is based on Korpelevich's extragradient method, hybrid steepest-descent method, and averaged mapping approach to the gradient-projection algorithm. We prove the strong convergence of the proposed algorithm to a unique solution of THVI (16) under suitable conditions. In addition, we also consider the application of the proposed algorithm to solving a hierarchical VIP with the same constraints.

We are now in a position to state and prove the first main result in this paper.

Theorem 24. *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a real Hilbert space H . Let $f : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a convex functional with L -Lipschitz continuous gradient ∇f . Let $N, N \geq 1$ be two integers. Let Θ be a bifunction from $C \times C$ to \mathbf{R} satisfying (H1)–(H4), let $\varphi : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a lower semicontinuous and convex functional, and let $A : H \rightarrow H$ be ζ -inverse strongly monotone. Let $R_k : C \rightarrow 2^H$ be a maximal monotone mapping and let $B_k : C \rightarrow H$ be η_k -inverse strongly monotone for $k = 1, 2, \dots, M$. Let $\{S_i\}_{i=1}^N$ be a finite family of nonexpansive mappings on H . Let $\tilde{A}_1 : H \rightarrow H$ be α -inverse strongly monotone and let $\tilde{A}_2 : H \rightarrow H$ be β -strongly monotone and κ -Lipschitz continuous. Assume that $\text{VI}(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1) \neq \emptyset$, where $\Omega := \bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \cap \bigcap_{k=1}^M I(B_k, R_k) \cap \Gamma$. Let $\mu \in (0, 2\beta/\kappa^2)$, $\{\alpha_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset (0, 1)$, $\{\rho_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset (0, 2\alpha)$, $\{\beta_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset [a, b] \subset (0, 1)$, $\{r_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset [c, d] \subset (0, 2\zeta)$, $\{\mu_{i,n}\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset [e, f] \subset (0, 1)$, $\{\lambda_{k,n}\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset [a_k, b_k] \subset (0, 2\eta_k)$, where $k \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}$ and $i \in \{1, 2, \dots, N\}$. For every $n \geq 1$, let W_n be the W -mapping generated by S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n}$. Assume that*

- (i) $K : H \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ is strongly convex with a constant $\sigma > 0$ and its derivative K' is Lipschitz continuous with a constant $\nu > 0$ such that the function $x \mapsto \langle y - x, K'(x) \rangle$ is weakly upper semicontinuous for each $y \in H$;

- (ii) for each $x \in H$, there exist a bounded subset $D_x \subset C$ and $z_x \in C$ such that, for any $y \notin D_x$,

$$\Theta(y, z_x) + \varphi(z_x) - \varphi(y) + \frac{1}{r}(K'(y) - K'(x), z_x - y) < 0; \tag{54}$$

- (iii) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n = 0, \sum_{n=1}^\infty \alpha_n = \infty$ and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (1/\alpha_n)|1 - (\rho_{n-1}/\rho_n)| = 0$;
- (iv) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\rho_n/\alpha_n) = 0, \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (1/\alpha_n)|(1/\rho_n) - (1/\rho_{n-1})| = 0$, and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (1/\rho_n)|1 - (\alpha_{n-1}/\alpha_n)| = 0$;
- (v) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (|\beta_n - \beta_{n-1}|/\alpha_n \rho_n) = 0$ and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (|\lambda_{k,n} - \lambda_{k,n-1}|/\alpha_n \rho_n) = 0$, for $k = 1, 2, \dots, M$;
- (vi) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (|r_n - r_{n-1}|/\alpha_n \rho_n) = 0$ and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (|\mu_{i,n} - \mu_{i,n-1}|/\alpha_n \rho_n) = 0$, for $i = 1, 2, \dots, N$.

For arbitrarily given $x_1 \in H$, let $\{x_n\}$ be a sequence generated by

$$\begin{aligned} u_n &= S_{r_n}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(I - r_n A)x_n, \\ v_n &= J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n}}(I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) J_{R_{M-1}, \lambda_{M-1,n}} \\ &\quad \times (I - \lambda_{M-1,n} B_{M-1}) \cdots J_{R_1, \lambda_{1,n}}(I - \lambda_{1,n} B_1)u_n, \tag{55} \\ y_n &= \beta_n T_n v_n + (1 - \beta_n) W_n(v_n - \rho_n \tilde{A}_1 v_n), \\ x_{n+1} &= y_n - \mu \alpha_n \tilde{A}_2 y_n, \quad \forall n \geq 1, \end{aligned}$$

where $P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) = s_n I + (1 - s_n) T_n$ (here T_n is nonexpansive, $s_n = (2 - \lambda_n L)/4 \in (0, 1/2)$ for each $\lambda_n \in (0, 2/L)$), $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} s_n = 0$ ($\Leftrightarrow \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \lambda_n = 2/L$), and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (|s_n - s_{n-1}|/\alpha_n \rho_n) = 0$. Then, whenever $S_r^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$ is firmly nonexpansive, the following hold:

- (i) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\|x_{n+1} - x_n\|/\rho_n) = 0$;
- (ii) $\omega_w(x_n) \subset \Omega$;
- (iii) $\omega_w(x_n) \subset \text{VI}(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1)$ provided $\|x_n - y_n\| = o(\rho_n)$ additionally.

Proof. Let $\{x^*\} = \text{VI}(\text{VI}(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1), \tilde{A}_2)$. Taking into account that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\rho_n/\alpha_n) = 0$, we may assume, without loss of generality, that $\rho_n \leq \alpha_n$ for all $n \geq 1$. Since ∇f is L -Lipschitzian, it follows that ∇f is $1/L$ -ism. By Lemma 13 (ii) we know that for $\lambda > 0, \lambda \nabla f$ is $1/\lambda L$ -ism. So by Lemma 13 (iii) we deduce that $I - \lambda \nabla f$ is $\lambda L/2$ -averaged. Now since the projection P_C is $1/2$ -averaged, it is easy to see from Lemma 14 (iv) that the composite $P_C(I - \lambda \nabla f)$ is $(2 + \lambda L)/4$ -averaged for $\lambda \in (0, 2/L)$. Hence, we obtain that, for each $n \geq 1, P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f)$ is $(2 + \lambda_n L)/4$ -averaged for each $\lambda_n \in (0, 2/L)$. Therefore, we can write

$$P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) = \frac{2 - \lambda_n L}{4} I + \frac{2 + \lambda_n L}{4} T_n = s_n I + (1 - s_n) T_n, \tag{56}$$

where T_n is nonexpansive and $s_n := s_n(\lambda_n) = (2 - \lambda_n L)/4 \in (0, 1/2)$ for each $\lambda_n \in (0, 2/L)$. It is clear that

$$\lambda_n \rightarrow \frac{2}{L} \iff s_n \rightarrow 0. \tag{57}$$

Since \widetilde{A}_2 is κ -Lipschitz continuous, we get

$$\|\widetilde{A}_2 y_n - \widetilde{A}_2 x^*\| \leq \kappa \|y_n - x^*\|, \quad \forall n \geq 1. \quad (58)$$

Put

$$\begin{aligned} \Lambda_n^k &= J_{R_k, \lambda_{k,n}} (I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) J_{R_{k-1}, \lambda_{k-1,n}} \\ &\quad \times (I - \lambda_{k-1,n} B_{k-1}) \cdots J_{R_1, \lambda_{1,n}} (I - \lambda_{1,n} B_1) \end{aligned} \quad (59)$$

for $k = 1, 2, \dots, M$ and $\Lambda_n^0 = I$, where I is the identity mapping on H . Then, we have $v_n = \Lambda_n^M u_n$.

We divide the rest of the proof into several steps.

Step 1. We prove that $\{x_n\}$ is bounded.

Indeed, take $p \in \Omega$ arbitrarily. Since $p = S_{r_n}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(p - r_n A p)$, A is ζ -inverse strongly monotone and $0 < r_n \leq 2\zeta$; utilizing the nonexpansivity of $S_{r_n}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}$, we have, for any $n \geq 1$,

$$\begin{aligned} \|u_n - p\|^2 &= \|S_{r_n}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(I - r_n A)x_n - S_{r_n}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(I - r_n A)p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|(I - r_n A)x_n - (I - r_n A)p\|^2 \\ &= \|(x_n - p) - r_n(Ax_n - Ap)\|^2 \\ &= \|x_n - p\|^2 - 2r_n \langle x_n - p, Ax_n - Ap \rangle \\ &\quad + r_n^2 \|Ax_n - Ap\|^2 \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - 2r_n \zeta \|Ax_n - Ap\|^2 + r_n^2 \|Ax_n - Ap\|^2 \\ &= \|x_n - p\|^2 + r_n(r_n - 2\zeta) \|Ax_n - Ap\|^2 \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2. \end{aligned} \quad (60)$$

Utilizing (21) and Lemma 20 we have

$$\begin{aligned} \|v_n - p\| &= \|J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n}}(I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n - J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n}} \\ &\quad \times (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} p\| \\ &\leq \|(I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n - (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} p\| \\ &\leq \|\Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^{M-1} p\| \\ &\quad \vdots \\ &\leq \|\Lambda_n^0 u_n - \Lambda_n^0 p\| = \|u_n - p\|. \end{aligned} \quad (61)$$

Combining (60) and (61), we have

$$\|v_n - p\| \leq \|x_n - p\|. \quad (62)$$

Since

$$p = P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f)p = s_n p + (1 - s_n) T_n p, \quad \forall \lambda_n \in \left(0, \frac{2}{L}\right), \quad (63)$$

where $s_n := s_n(\lambda_n) = (2 - \lambda_n L)/4 \in (0, 1/2)$, it is clear that $T_n p = p$ for each $\lambda_n \in (0, 2/L)$. Since \widetilde{A}_1 is α -inverse strongly monotone and $\{\rho_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset (0, 2\alpha]$, utilizing the nonexpansivity of T_n , we obtain from (21), (55), and (62) that

$$\begin{aligned} \|y_n - p\| &= \|\beta_n (T_n v_n - p) + (1 - \beta_n) [W_n(v_n - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1 v_n) - p]\| \\ &\leq \beta_n \|T_n v_n - p\| + (1 - \beta_n) \|W_n(v_n - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1 v_n) - p\| \\ &\leq \beta_n \|v_n - p\| + (1 - \beta_n) \|(v_n - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1 v_n) - p\| \\ &= \beta_n \|v_n - p\| \\ &\quad + (1 - \beta_n) \|(I - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1)v_n - (I - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1)p - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1 p\| \\ &\leq \beta_n \|v_n - p\| + (1 - \beta_n) \\ &\quad \times (\|(I - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1)v_n - (I - \rho_n \widetilde{A}_1)p\| + \rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 p\|) \\ &\leq \beta_n \|v_n - p\| + (1 - \beta_n) (\|v_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 p\|) \\ &\leq \|v_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 p\| \leq \|x_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 p\|. \end{aligned} \quad (64)$$

Utilizing Lemma 17, we obtain from (55) and $\rho_n \leq \alpha_n$ that

$$\begin{aligned} \|x_{n+1} - p\| &= \|y_n - \mu \alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2 y_n - p\| \\ &\leq \|(I - \mu \alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2)y_n - (I - \mu \alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2)p\| \\ &\quad + \|(I - \mu \alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2)p - p\| \\ &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|y_n - p\| + \mu \alpha_n \|\widetilde{A}_2 p\| \\ &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) (\|x_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 p\|) + \alpha_n \mu \|\widetilde{A}_2 p\| \\ &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 p\| + \alpha_n \mu \|\widetilde{A}_2 p\| \\ &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - p\| + \alpha_n (\|\widetilde{A}_1 p\| + \mu \|\widetilde{A}_2 p\|) \\ &= (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - p\| + \alpha_n \tau \cdot \frac{\|\widetilde{A}_1 p\| + \mu \|\widetilde{A}_2 p\|}{\tau} \\ &\leq \max \left\{ \|x_n - p\|, \frac{\|\widetilde{A}_1 p\| + \mu \|\widetilde{A}_2 p\|}{\tau} \right\}, \end{aligned} \quad (65)$$

where $\tau := 1 - \sqrt{1 - \mu(2\beta - \mu\kappa^2)}$. By induction, we find that

Thus, $\{x_n\}_{n=1}^\infty$ is bounded and so are the sequences $\{u_n\}_{n=1}^\infty$, $\{v_n\}_{n=1}^\infty$ and $\{y_n\}_{n=1}^\infty$.

Step 2. We prove that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\|x_{n+1} - x_n\|/\rho_n) = 0$.

Indeed, put $\tilde{v}_n = v_n - \rho_n \tilde{A}_1 v_n$ for all $n \geq 1$. Utilizing (21) and (51), we obtain that

 &\quad + \|J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n+1}} (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1} \\
 &\quad - J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n}} (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n\| \\
 &\leq \|(I - \lambda_{M,n+1} B_M) \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1} - (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1}\| \\

 &\quad \quad \left. + \frac{1}{\lambda_{M,n}} \|(I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1} \right. \\
 &\quad \quad \left. - J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n}} (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n\| \right) \\
 &\leq |\lambda_{M,n+1} - \lambda_{M,n}| (\|B_M \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}) \\
 &\quad + \|\Lambda_{n+1}^{N-1} u_{n+1} - \Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n\| \\
 &\leq |\lambda_{M,n+1} - \lambda_{M,n}| (\|B_M \Lambda_{n+1}^{N-1} u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}) \\
 &\quad + |\lambda_{M-1,n+1} - \lambda_{M-1,n}| (\|B_{M-1} \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-2} u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}) \\
 &\quad + \|\Lambda_{n+1}^{M-2} u_{n+1} - \Lambda_n^{M-2} u_n\| \\
 &\quad \vdots \\
 &\leq |\lambda_{M,n+1} - \lambda_{M,n}| (\|B_M \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}) \\
 &\quad + |\lambda_{M-1,n+1} - \lambda_{M-1,n}| (\|B_{M-1} \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-2} u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}) \\
 &\quad + \dots + |\lambda_{1,n+1} - \lambda_{1,n}| (\|B_1 \Lambda_{n+1}^0 u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}) \\
 &\quad + \|\Lambda_{n+1}^0 u_{n+1} - \Lambda_n^0 u_n\| \\
 &\leq \tilde{M}_0 \sum_{k=1}^M |\lambda_{k,n+1} - \lambda_{k,n}| + \|u_{n+1} - u_n\|,
 \end{aligned} \tag{67}$$

 &\quad \left. + \frac{1}{\lambda_{M,n}} \|(I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_{n+1}^{M-1} u_{n+1} \right. \\
 &\quad \left. - J_{R_M, \lambda_{M,n}} (I - \lambda_{M,n} B_M) \Lambda_n^{M-1} u_n\| \right\} \leq \tilde{M},
 \end{aligned} \tag{68}$$

for some $\tilde{M} > 0$ and $\sup_{n \geq 1} \{\sum_{k=1}^M \|B_k \Lambda_{n+1}^{k-1} u_{n+1}\| + \tilde{M}\} \leq \tilde{M}_0$ for some $\tilde{M}_0 > 0$. Hence, it follows from (21) and $\{\rho_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset (0, 2\alpha)$ that

 &\leq \|v_{n+1} - v_n\| + |\rho_{n+1} - \rho_n| \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \\
 &\leq \tilde{M}_0 \sum_{k=1}^M |\lambda_{k,n+1} - \lambda_{k,n}| + \|u_{n+1} - u_n\| \\

$$\begin{aligned} &\leq \|x_{n+1} - x_n\| + |r_{n+1} - r_n| \\ &\quad \times \left(\|Ax_n\| + \frac{\gamma}{c\sigma} \|S_{r_{n+1}}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(I - r_n A)x_n - (I - r_n A)x_n\| \right) \\ &\leq \|x_{n+1} - x_n\| + |r_{n+1} - r_n| \widetilde{M}_1, \end{aligned} \tag{70}$$

where $\sup_{n \geq 1} \{\|Ax_n\| + (\gamma/c\sigma)\|S_{r_{n+1}}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(I - r_n A)x_n - (I - r_n A)x_n\|\} \leq \widetilde{M}_1$ for some $\widetilde{M}_1 > 0$.

In the meantime, from (31), since S_i and $U_{i,n}$ for $i = 1, 2, \dots, N$ are nonexpansive, we get

Furthermore, since ∇f is $1/L$ -ism, $P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f)$ is nonexpansive for $\lambda_n \in (0, 2/L)$. So, it follows that, for any given $p \in \Omega$,

where $\sup_{n \geq 1} \{L \|P_C(I - \lambda_{n+1}\nabla f)v_n\| + 4 \|\nabla f(v_n)\| + L \|v_n\|\} \leq \widetilde{M}_3$ for some $\widetilde{M}_3 > 0$. So, we conclude that

$$\begin{aligned} & \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n(1 - \beta_n)\langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - p \rangle \\ &\quad - \beta_n(1 - \beta_n)\|T_n v_n - W_n \tilde{v}_n\|^2 - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \\ &\leq \|u_n - p\|^2 + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| \\ &\quad + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\| \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|x_n - u_n\|^2 \\ &\quad + 2r_n \|Ax_n - Ap\| \|x_n - u_n\| \\ &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\|, \end{aligned} \tag{95}$$

which hence yields

$$\begin{aligned} & \|x_n - u_n\|^2 \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 \\ &\quad + 2r_n \|Ax_n - Ap\| \|x_n - u_n\| \\ &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\| \\ &\leq \|x_n - x_{n+1}\| (\|x_n - p\| + \|x_{n+1} - p\|) \\ &\quad + 2r_n \|Ax_n - Ap\| \|x_n - u_n\| \\ &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\|. \end{aligned} \tag{96}$$

Since $\alpha_n \rightarrow 0, \rho_n \rightarrow 0, \|x_{n+1} - x_n\| \rightarrow 0$ and $\{x_n\}, \{u_n\}, \{v_n\}, \{\tilde{v}_n\}$ are bounded sequences, it follows from (92) and $\{r_n\}_{n=1}^\infty \subset [c, d] \subset (0, 2\zeta)$ that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - u_n\| = 0. \tag{97}$$

Next we show that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|A_k \Lambda_n^k u_n - A_k p\| = 0$, $k = 1, 2, \dots, M$. Observe that

$$\begin{aligned} & \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \\ &= \|J_{R_k, \lambda_{k,n}}(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - J_{R_k, \lambda_{k,n}}(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - (I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - p\|^2 + \lambda_{k,n} (\lambda_{k,n} - 2\eta_k) \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|u_n - p\|^2 + \lambda_{k,n} (\lambda_{k,n} - 2\eta_k) \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 + \lambda_{k,n} (\lambda_{k,n} - 2\eta_k) \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|^2. \end{aligned} \tag{98}$$

Combining (86) and (98), we get

$$\begin{aligned} & \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - p \rangle \\ &\quad - \beta_n (1 - \beta_n) \|T_n v_n - W_n \tilde{v}_n\|^2 - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \\ &\leq \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| \\ &\quad + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\| \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 + \lambda_{k,n} (\lambda_{k,n} - 2\eta_k) \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|^2 \\ &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\|, \end{aligned} \tag{99}$$

which hence yields

$$\begin{aligned} & \lambda_{k,n} (2\eta_k - \lambda_{k,n}) \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| \\ &\quad + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\| \\ &\leq \|x_n - x_{n+1}\| (\|x_n - p\| + \|x_{n+1} - p\|) \\ &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\|. \end{aligned} \tag{100}$$

Since $\alpha_n \rightarrow 0$, $\rho_n \rightarrow 0$, $\|x_{n+1} - x_n\| \rightarrow 0$ and $\{x_n\}, \{v_n\}, \{\tilde{v}_n\}$ are bounded sequences, it follows from $\{\lambda_{k,n}\} \subset [a_k, b_k] \subset (0, 2\eta_k)$, $\forall k \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}$ that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\| = 0, \quad \forall k \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}. \tag{101}$$

By Lemma 11 (a) and Lemma 20, we obtain

$$\begin{aligned} & \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \\ &= \|J_{R_k, \lambda_{k,n}}(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - J_{R_k, \lambda_{k,n}}(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) p\|^2 \\ &\leq \langle (I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - (I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) p, \Lambda_n^k u_n - p \rangle \\ &= \frac{1}{2} \left(\|(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - (I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) p\|^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. + \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. - \|(I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - (I - \lambda_{k,n} B_k) p \right. \\ &\quad \left. - (\Lambda_n^k u_n - p) \right\|^2 \\ &\leq \frac{1}{2} \left(\|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - p\|^2 + \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n - \lambda_{k,n} (B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p)\|^2 \right) \\ &\leq \frac{1}{2} \left(\|u_n - p\|^2 + \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n - \lambda_{k,n} (B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p)\|^2 \right) \\ &\leq \frac{1}{2} \left(\|x_n - p\|^2 + \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \right. \\ &\quad \left. - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n - \lambda_{k,n} (B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p)\|^2 \right), \end{aligned} \tag{102}$$

which implies

$$\begin{aligned} & \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n - \lambda_{k,n} (B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p)\|^2 \\ &= \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\|^2 \\ &\quad - \lambda_{k,n}^2 \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|^2 \\ &\quad + 2\lambda_{k,n} \langle \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n, B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p \rangle \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\|^2 \\ &\quad + 2\lambda_{k,n} \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\| \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\|. \end{aligned} \tag{103}$$

Combining (86) and (103) we conclude that

$$\begin{aligned} & \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - p \rangle \\ &\quad - \beta_n (1 - \beta_n) \|T_n v_n - W_n \tilde{v}_n\|^2 \\ &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 &\leq \|\Lambda_n^k u_n - p\|^2 + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| \\
 &\quad + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\| \\
 &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\|^2 \\
 &\quad + 2\lambda_{k,n} \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\| \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\| \\
 &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\|,
 \end{aligned} \tag{104}$$

which implies

$$\begin{aligned}
 &\|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\|^2 \\
 &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 \\
 &\quad + 2\lambda_{k,n} \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\| \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\| \\
 &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\| \\
 &\leq \|x_n - x_{n+1}\| (\|x_n - p\| + \|x_{n+1} - p\|) \\
 &\quad + 2\lambda_{k,n} \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\| \|B_k \Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - B_k p\| \\
 &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - p\| + 2\mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 p\| \|x_{n+1} - p\|.
 \end{aligned} \tag{105}$$

Since $\alpha_n \rightarrow 0, \rho_n \rightarrow 0, \|x_{n+1} - x_n\| \rightarrow 0$, and $\{x_n\}, \{u_n\}, \{v_n\}, \{\tilde{v}_n\}$ are bounded sequences, it follows from (101) and $\{\lambda_{k,n}\} \subset [a_k, b_k] \subset (0, 2\eta_k), \forall k \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}$ that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|\Lambda_n^{k-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^k u_n\| = 0, \quad \forall k \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}. \tag{106}$$

Hence from (106) we get

$$\begin{aligned}
 \|u_n - v_n\| &= \|\Lambda_n^0 u_n - \Lambda_n^N u_n\| \\
 &\leq \|\Lambda_n^0 u_n - \Lambda_n^1 u_n\| + \|\Lambda_n^1 u_n - \Lambda_n^2 u_n\| \\
 &\quad + \dots + \|\Lambda_n^{N-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^N u_n\| \rightarrow 0 \\
 &\quad \text{as } n \rightarrow \infty.
 \end{aligned} \tag{107}$$

Thus, from (97) and (107) we obtain

$$\|x_n - v_n\| \leq \|x_n - u_n\| + \|u_n - v_n\| \rightarrow 0 \quad \text{as } n \rightarrow \infty. \tag{108}$$

On the other hand, from (55) and $\|x_{n+1} - x_n\| \rightarrow 0$ we obtain

$$\begin{aligned}
 \|x_n - y_n\| &\leq \|x_n - x_{n+1}\| + \|x_{n+1} - y_n\| \\
 &\leq \|x_n - x_{n+1}\| + \mu\alpha_n \|\tilde{A}_2 y_n\| \rightarrow 0 \\
 &\quad \text{as } n \rightarrow \infty.
 \end{aligned} \tag{109}$$

Note that

$$\begin{aligned}
 \|T_n v_n - v_n\| &\leq \|T_n v_n - y_n\| + \|y_n - x_n\| + \|x_n - v_n\| \\
 &\leq (1 - \beta_n) \|W_n \tilde{v}_n - T_n v_n\| \\
 &\quad + \|y_n - x_n\| + \|x_n - v_n\| \\
 &\leq \|W_n \tilde{v}_n - T_n v_n\| + \|y_n - x_n\| + \|x_n - v_n\|.
 \end{aligned} \tag{110}$$

Hence, from (88), (108), and (109) it follows that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|T_n v_n - v_n\| = 0. \tag{111}$$

Also, observe that

$$\begin{aligned}
 \|P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) v_n - v_n\| &= \|s_n v_n + (1 - s_n) T_n v_n - v_n\| \\
 &= (1 - s_n) \|T_n v_n - v_n\| \\
 &\leq \|T_n v_n - v_n\|,
 \end{aligned} \tag{112}$$

where $s_n = (2 - \lambda_n L)/4 \in (0, 1/2)$ for each $\lambda_n \in (0, 2/L)$. Hence we have

$$\begin{aligned}
 &\|P_C\left(I - \frac{2}{L} \nabla f\right) v_n - v_n\| \\
 &\leq \|P_C\left(I - \frac{2}{L} \nabla f\right) v_n - P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) v_n\| \\
 &\quad + \|P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) v_n - v_n\| \\
 &\leq \left\| \left(I - \frac{2}{L} \nabla f\right) v_n - (I - \lambda_n \nabla f) v_n \right\| \\
 &\quad + \|P_C(I - \lambda_n \nabla f) v_n - v_n\| \\
 &\leq \left(\frac{2}{L} - \lambda_n\right) \|\nabla f(v_n)\| + \|T_n v_n - v_n\|.
 \end{aligned} \tag{113}$$

From the boundedness of $\{v_n\}, s_n \rightarrow 0 (\Leftrightarrow \lambda_n \rightarrow 2/L)$ and $\|T_n v_n - v_n\| \rightarrow 0$ (due to (111)), it follows that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|v_n - P_C\left(I - \frac{2}{L} \nabla f\right) v_n\| = 0. \tag{114}$$

Since $\|\tilde{v}_n - x_n\| \leq \|v_n - x_n\| + \rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|$, from (108) and $\rho_n \rightarrow 0$, we get

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|\tilde{v}_n - x_n\| = 0. \tag{115}$$

So, from (88), (111), and $\rho_n \rightarrow 0$ we deduce that

$$\begin{aligned}
 &\|W_n \tilde{v}_n - \tilde{v}_n\| \\
 &\leq \|W_n \tilde{v}_n - T_n v_n\| + \|T_n v_n - v_n\| + \|v_n - \tilde{v}_n\| \\
 &= \|W_n \tilde{v}_n - T_n v_n\| + \|T_n v_n - v_n\| + \rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \rightarrow 0 \\
 &\quad \text{as } n \rightarrow \infty.
 \end{aligned} \tag{116}$$

Step 4. We prove that $\omega_w(x_n) \subset \Omega$.

Indeed, since H is reflexive and $\{x_n\}$ is bounded, there exists at least a weak convergence subsequence of $\{x_n\}$. Hence it is known that $\omega_w(x_n) \neq \emptyset$. Now, take an arbitrary $w \in \omega_w(x_n)$. Then there exists a subsequence $\{x_{n_i}\}$ of $\{x_n\}$ such that $x_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$. From (97), (106), (108), and (115), we have that $u_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$, $v_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$, $\tilde{v}_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$ and $\Lambda_n^m u_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$ for $m = 1, 2, \dots, M$. Utilizing Lemma 15, we deduce from $v_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$ and (114) that $w \in \text{Fix}(P_C(I - (2/L)\nabla f)) = \text{VI}(C, \nabla f) = \Gamma$. Now, let us show that $w \in \cap_{l=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_l)$. To see this, we observe that we may assume that (by passing to a further subsequence if necessary)

$$\mu_{l,n_i} \longrightarrow \mu_l \in (0, 1) \quad (l = 1, 2, \dots, N). \quad (117)$$

Let W be the W -mapping generated by S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_1, \mu_2, \dots, \mu_N$. Then, by Proposition 9, we have, for every $x \in H$,

$$W_{n_i} x \longrightarrow Wx \quad \text{as } i \longrightarrow \infty. \quad (118)$$

Moreover, from Proposition 8 it follows that $\text{Fix}(W) = \cap_{l=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_l)$. Assume that $w \notin \cap_{l=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_l)$; then, $w \neq Ww$. Since $\tilde{v}_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$ and $\|\tilde{v}_{n_i} - W_{n_i} \tilde{v}_{n_i}\| \rightarrow 0$ (due to (116)), in terms of Opial's property of a Hilbert space, we conclude from (118) that

$$\begin{aligned} & \liminf_{i \rightarrow \infty} \|\tilde{v}_{n_i} - w\| \\ & < \liminf_{i \rightarrow \infty} \|\tilde{v}_{n_i} - Ww\| \\ & \leq \liminf_{i \rightarrow \infty} (\|\tilde{v}_{n_i} - W_{n_i} \tilde{v}_{n_i}\| + \|W_{n_i} \tilde{v}_{n_i} - W_{n_i} w\|) \\ & \quad + \|W_{n_i} w - Ww\| \\ & = \liminf_{i \rightarrow \infty} \|W_{n_i} \tilde{v}_{n_i} - W_{n_i} w\| \leq \liminf_{i \rightarrow \infty} \|\tilde{v}_{n_i} - w\|. \end{aligned} \quad (119)$$

This is a contradiction. So, we get $w \in \cap_{l=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_l)$. Next, we prove that $w \in \cap_{m=1}^M I(B_m, R_m)$. As a matter of fact, since B_m is η_m -inverse strongly monotone, B_m is a monotone and Lipschitz continuous mapping. It follows from Lemma 23 that $R_m + B_m$ is maximal monotone. Let $(v, g) \in G(R_m + B_m)$, that is, $g - B_m v \in R_m v$. Again, since $\Lambda_n^m u_n = J_{R_m, \lambda_{m,n}}(I - \lambda_{m,n} B_m) \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n$, $n \geq 1, m \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}$, we have

$$\Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n - \lambda_{m,n} B_m \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n \in (I + \lambda_{m,n} R_m) \Lambda_n^m u_n, \quad (120)$$

that is,

$$\frac{1}{\lambda_{m,n}} (\Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^m u_n - \lambda_{m,n} B_m \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n) \in R_m \Lambda_n^m u_n. \quad (121)$$

In terms of the monotonicity of R_m , we get

$$\begin{aligned} & \left\langle v - \Lambda_n^m u_n, g - B_m v - \frac{1}{\lambda_{m,n}} \right. \\ & \quad \left. \times (\Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^m u_n - \lambda_{m,n} B_m \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n) \right\rangle \geq 0, \end{aligned} \quad (122)$$

and hence

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle v - \Lambda_n^m u_n, g \rangle \\ & \geq \left\langle v - \Lambda_n^m u_n, B_m v + \frac{1}{\lambda_{m,n}} \right. \\ & \quad \left. \times (\Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^m u_n - \lambda_{m,n} B_m \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n) \right\rangle \\ & = \left\langle v - \Lambda_n^m u_n, B_m v - B_m \Lambda_n^m u_n + B_m \Lambda_n^m u_n - B_m \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n \right. \\ & \quad \left. + \frac{1}{\lambda_{m,n}} (\Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^m u_n) \right\rangle \\ & \geq \left\langle v - \Lambda_n^m u_n, B_m \Lambda_n^m u_n - B_m \Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n \right\rangle \\ & \quad + \left\langle v - \Lambda_n^m u_n, \frac{1}{\lambda_{m,n}} (\Lambda_n^{m-1} u_n - \Lambda_n^m u_n) \right\rangle. \end{aligned} \quad (123)$$

In particular,

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle v - \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i}, g \rangle \\ & \geq \langle v - \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i}, B_m \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i} - B_m \Lambda_{n_i}^{m-1} u_{n_i} \rangle \\ & \quad + \left\langle v - \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i}, \frac{1}{\lambda_{m,n_i}} (\Lambda_{n_i}^{m-1} u_{n_i} - \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i}) \right\rangle. \end{aligned} \quad (124)$$

Since $\|\Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i} - \Lambda_{n_i}^{m-1} u_{n_i}\| \rightarrow 0$ (due to (106)) and $\|B_m \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i} - B_m \Lambda_{n_i}^{m-1} u_{n_i}\| \rightarrow 0$ (due to the Lipschitz continuity of B_m), we conclude from $\Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$ and $\{\lambda_{m,n}\} \subset [a_m, b_m] \subset (0, 2\eta_m), m \in \{1, 2, \dots, M\}$ that

$$\lim_{i \rightarrow \infty} \langle v - \Lambda_{n_i}^m u_{n_i}, g \rangle = \langle v - w, g \rangle \geq 0. \quad (125)$$

It follows from the maximal monotonicity of $B_m + R_m$ that $0 \in (R_m + B_m)w$; that is, $w \in I(B_m, R_m)$. Therefore, $w \in \cap_{m=1}^M I(B_m, R_m)$.

Next, we show that $w \in \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A)$. In fact, from $u_n = S_{r_n}^{(\Theta, \varphi)}(I - r_n A)x_n$, we know that

$$\begin{aligned} & \Theta(u_n, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_n) + \langle Ax_n, y - u_n \rangle \\ & \quad + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle K'(u_n) - K'(x_n), y - u_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C. \end{aligned} \quad (126)$$

From (H2) it follows that

$$\begin{aligned} & \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_n) + \langle Ax_n, y - u_n \rangle \\ & \quad + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle K'(u_n) - K'(x_n), y - u_n \rangle \geq \Theta(y, u_n), \end{aligned} \quad (127)$$

$\forall y \in C$.

Replacing n by n_i , we have

$$\begin{aligned} & \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_{n_i}) + \langle Ax_{n_i}, y - u_{n_i} \rangle \\ & + \left\langle \frac{K'(u_{n_i}) - K'(x_{n_i})}{r_{n_i}}, y - u_{n_i} \right\rangle \geq \Theta(y, u_{n_i}), \\ & \forall y \in C. \end{aligned} \tag{128}$$

Put $u_t = ty + (1 - t)w$ for all $t \in (0, 1]$ and $y \in C$. Then, from (128), we have

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle u_t - u_{n_i}, Au_t \rangle \\ & \geq \langle u_t - u_{n_i}, Au_t \rangle - \varphi(u_t) + \varphi(u_{n_i}) - \langle u_t - u_{n_i}, Ax_{n_i} \rangle \\ & \quad - \left\langle \frac{K'(u_{n_i}) - K'(x_{n_i})}{r_{n_i}}, u_t - u_{n_i} \right\rangle + \Theta(u_t, u_{n_i}) \\ & \geq \langle u_t - u_{n_i}, Au_t - Au_{n_i} \rangle + \langle u_t - u_{n_i}, Au_{n_i} - Ax_{n_i} \rangle \\ & \quad - \varphi(u_t) + \varphi(u_{n_i}) - \left\langle \frac{K'(u_{n_i}) - K'(x_{n_i})}{r_{n_i}}, u_t - u_{n_i} \right\rangle \\ & \quad + \Theta(u_t, u_{n_i}). \end{aligned} \tag{129}$$

Since $\|u_{n_i} - x_{n_i}\| \rightarrow 0$ as $i \rightarrow \infty$, we deduce from the Lipschitz continuity of A and K' that $\|Au_{n_i} - Ax_{n_i}\| \rightarrow 0$ and $\|K'(u_{n_i}) - K'(x_{n_i})\| \rightarrow 0$ as $i \rightarrow \infty$. Furthermore, from the monotonicity of A , we have $\langle u_t - u_{n_i}, Au_t - Au_{n_i} \rangle \geq 0$. So, from (H4), the weakly lower semicontinuity of φ , $(K'(u_{n_i}) - K'(x_{n_i}))/r_{n_i} \rightarrow 0$ and $u_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$, we have

$$\langle u_t - w, Au_t \rangle \geq -\varphi(u_t) + \varphi(w) + \Theta(u_t, w), \quad \text{as } i \rightarrow \infty. \tag{130}$$

From (H1), (H4), and (130) we also have

$$\begin{aligned} 0 & = \Theta(u_t, u_t) + \varphi(u_t) - \varphi(u_t) \\ & \leq t\Theta(u_t, y) + (1 - t)\Theta(u_t, w) + t\varphi(y) \\ & \quad + (1 - t)\varphi(w) - \varphi(u_t) \\ & = t[\Theta(u_t, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_t)] \\ & \quad + (1 - t)[\Theta(u_t, w) + \varphi(w) - \varphi(w) - \varphi(u_t)] \\ & \leq t[\Theta(u_t, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_t)] \\ & \quad + (1 - t)\langle u_t - w, Au_t \rangle \\ & = t[\Theta(u_t, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_t)] + (1 - t)t\langle y - w, Au_t \rangle, \end{aligned} \tag{131}$$

and hence

$$0 \leq \Theta(u_t, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_t) + (1 - t)\langle y - w, Au_t \rangle. \tag{132}$$

Letting $t \rightarrow 0$, we have, for each $y \in C$,

$$0 \leq \Theta(w, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(w) + \langle Aw, y - w \rangle. \tag{133}$$

This implies that $w \in \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A)$. Therefore, $w \in \bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \cap \bigcap_{k=1}^M I(B_k, R_k) \cap \Gamma := \Omega$. This shows that $\omega_w(x_n) \subset \Omega$.

Step 5. We prove that $\omega_w(x_n) \subset \text{VI}(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1)$ provided $\|x_n - y_n\| = o(\rho_n)$ additionally.

Indeed, take an arbitrary $w \in \omega_w(x_n)$. Then, there exists a subsequence $\{x_{n_i}\}$ of $\{x_n\}$ such that $x_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$. Since A_1 is α -inverse strongly monotone, from (55), (62), and (66) we conclude that for all $p \in \Omega$

$$\begin{aligned} & \|y_n - p\|^2 \\ & = \|\beta_n(T_n v_n - p) + (1 - \beta_n)(W_n \tilde{v}_n - p)\|^2 \\ & \leq \beta_n \|T_n v_n - p\|^2 + (1 - \beta_n) \|W_n \tilde{v}_n - p\|^2 \\ & \leq \beta_n \|v_n - p\|^2 + (1 - \beta_n) \|\tilde{v}_n - p\|^2 \\ & = \beta_n \|v_n - p\|^2 + (1 - \beta_n) \|v_n - p - \rho_n \tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 \\ & \leq \beta_n \|v_n - p\|^2 + (1 - \beta_n) [\|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n \langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - p \rangle] \\ & = \beta_n \|v_n - p\|^2 + (1 - \beta_n) \\ & \quad \times [\|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n (\langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, v_n - p \rangle \\ & \quad \quad \quad + \langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - v_n \rangle)] \\ & = \beta_n \|v_n - p\|^2 + (1 - \beta_n) \\ & \quad \times [\|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n \\ & \quad \quad \times (\langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n - \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \\ & \quad \quad \quad + \langle \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle + \langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - v_n \rangle)] \\ & = \|v_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \\ & \quad \times (\langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n - \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \\ & \quad \quad + \langle \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle + \langle \tilde{A}_1 v_n, \tilde{v}_n - v_n \rangle) \\ & \leq \|x_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \langle \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \\ & \quad + 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - v_n\|, \end{aligned} \tag{134}$$

which implies that

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \\ & \leq \frac{1}{2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n)} (\|x_n - p\|^2 - \|y_n - p\|^2) \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{aligned}
 &+ \|\widetilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\bar{v}_n - v_n\| \\
 \leq &\frac{\|x_n - y_n\|}{2\rho_n(1 - \beta_n)} (\|x_n - p\| + \|y_n - p\|) + \rho_n^2 \|\widetilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2.
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{135}$$

So, from $\rho_n \rightarrow 0$ and the assumption $\|x_n - y_n\| = o(\rho_n)$, we get

$$\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \leq 0.
 \tag{136}$$

Thus, it follows from (108) that for all $p \in \Omega$

$$\begin{aligned}
 \langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, w - p \rangle &= \lim_{i \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, x_{n_i} - p \rangle \\
 &\leq \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, x_n - p \rangle \\
 &= \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle + \langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, x_n - v_n \rangle) \\
 &= \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \leq 0,
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{137}$$

that is,

$$\langle \widetilde{A}_1 p, p - w \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in \Omega.
 \tag{138}$$

Since \widetilde{A}_1 is α -inverse strongly monotone, by Minty's Lemma [23] we know that (138) is equivalent to the VIP

$$\langle \widetilde{A}_1 w, p - w \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in \Omega.
 \tag{139}$$

This shows that $w \in \text{VI}(\Omega, \widetilde{A}_1)$. Therefore, $\omega_w(x_n) \subset \text{VI}(\Omega, \widetilde{A}_1)$. \square

Theorem 25. Assume that all the conditions in Theorem 24 are satisfied. Then, we have that

- (i) $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to a point $u^* \in \Omega$, which is a unique solution of the VIP

$$\langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, p - u^* \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in \Omega;
 \tag{140}$$

- (ii) $\{x_n\}$ converges strongly to a unique solution of THVI (16) provided $\|x_n - y_n\| = o(\rho_n)$ additionally.

Proof. Since \widetilde{A}_2 is β -strongly monotone and L -Lipschitz continuous, there exists a unique solution $u^* \in \Omega$ of the VIP

$$\langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, p - u^* \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in \Omega.
 \tag{141}$$

Now, let us show that

$$\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_n \rangle \leq 0.
 \tag{142}$$

Since $\{x_n\}$ is bounded, we may assume, without loss of generality, that there exists a subsequence $\{x_{n_i}\}$ of $\{x_n\}$ such that $x_{n_i} \rightharpoonup w$ and

$$\begin{aligned}
 \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_n \rangle &= \lim_{i \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_{n_i} \rangle \\
 &= \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - w \rangle.
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{143}$$

In terms of Theorem 24 (ii), we know that $w \in \omega_w(x_n) \subset \Omega$. So, from (141) it follows that

$$\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_n \rangle = \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - w \rangle \leq 0.
 \tag{144}$$

Next, let us show that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - u^*\| = 0$. In fact, by utilizing Lemma 10, from (55) and (134) with $p = u^*$, we get

$$\begin{aligned}
 &\|x_{n+1} - u^*\|^2 \\
 &= \|(I - \mu\alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2) y_n - u^*\|^2 \\
 &= \|(I - \mu\alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2) y_n - (I - \mu\alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2) u^* \\
 &\quad + (I - \mu\alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2) u^* - u^*\|^2 \\
 &\leq \|(I - \mu\alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2) y_n - (I - \mu\alpha_n \widetilde{A}_2) u^*\|^2 \\
 &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, x_{n+1} - u^* \rangle \\
 &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|y_n - u^*\|^2 - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, x_{n+1} - u^* \rangle \\
 &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) [\|x_n - u^*\|^2 - 2\rho_n(1 - \beta_n) \langle \widetilde{A}_1 u^*, v_n - u^* \rangle \\
 &\quad + 2\rho_n(1 - \beta_n) \|\widetilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\bar{v}_n - v_n\|] \\
 &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, x_{n+1} - u^* \rangle \\
 &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - u^*\|^2 \\
 &\quad + 2\rho_n \|\widetilde{A}_1 u^*\| \|v_n - u^*\| + 2\rho_n^2 \|\widetilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 \\
 &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, x_{n+1} - u^* \rangle \\
 &= (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - u^*\|^2 \\
 &\quad + \alpha_n \tau \cdot \frac{2}{\tau} \left\{ \frac{\rho_n}{\alpha_n} \|\widetilde{A}_1 u^*\| \|v_n - u^*\| + \frac{\rho_n^2}{\alpha_n} \|\widetilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 \right. \\
 &\quad \left. + \mu \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_{n+1} \rangle \right\},
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{145}$$

where $\tau = 1 - \sqrt{1 - \mu(2\beta - \mu\kappa^2)}$.

Since $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \alpha_n = \infty, \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\rho_n/\alpha_n) = 0$, and $\limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_{n+1} \rangle \leq 0$ (due to (144)), we deduce that $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \alpha_n \tau = \infty$ and

$$\begin{aligned}
 \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{2}{\tau} \left\{ \frac{\rho_n}{\alpha_n} \|\widetilde{A}_1 u^*\| \|v_n - u^*\| + \frac{\rho_n^2}{\alpha_n} \|\widetilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 \right. \\
 \left. + \mu \langle \widetilde{A}_2 u^*, u^* - x_{n+1} \rangle \right\} \leq 0.
 \end{aligned}
 \tag{146}$$

Therefore, by applying Lemma 18 to (145) we infer that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - u^*\| = 0$.

Finally, we prove that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - x^*\| = 0$ provided $\|x_n - y_n\| = o(\alpha_n)$ additionally, where $\{x^*\} = VI(VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1), \tilde{A}_2)$.

Indeed, first of all, let us show that $\omega_w(x_n) = \{x^*\}$. As a matter of fact, take an arbitrary $w \in \omega_w(x_n)$. Then, there exists a subsequence $\{x_{n_j}\}$ of $\{x_n\}$ such that $x_{n_j} \rightarrow w$. Moreover, by Theorem 24 (iii) we know that $w \in \omega_w(x_n) \subset VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1)$. Utilizing Lemmas 10 and 17, from (55) and (134), we deduce that for all $p \in VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1)$

$$\begin{aligned} & \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2 \\ &= \|(I - \mu\alpha_n \tilde{A}_2) y_n - p\|^2 \\ &= \|(I - \mu\alpha_n \tilde{A}_2) y_n - (I - \mu\alpha_n \tilde{A}_2) p + (I - \mu\alpha_n \tilde{A}_2) p - p\|^2 \\ &\leq \|(I - \mu\alpha_n \tilde{A}_2) y_n - (I - \mu\alpha_n \tilde{A}_2) p\|^2 \\ &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \\ &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|y_n - p\|^2 - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \\ &\leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) [\|x_n - p\|^2 - 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \langle \tilde{A}_1 p, v_n - p \rangle \\ &\quad + 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - v_n\|] \\ &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \\ &\leq \|x_n - p\|^2 + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 p\| \|v_n - p\| + 2\rho_n^2 \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 \\ &\quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle, \end{aligned} \tag{147}$$

where $\tau = 1 - \sqrt{1 - \mu(2\beta - \mu\kappa^2)}$. So, it follows that

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \\ & \leq \frac{1}{2\mu\alpha_n} (\|x_n - p\|^2 - \|x_{n+1} - p\|^2) \\ & \quad + \frac{\rho_n}{\mu\alpha_n} [\|\tilde{A}_1 p\| \|v_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2] \\ & \leq \frac{\|x_n - x_{n+1}\|}{2\mu\alpha_n} (\|x_n - p\| + \|x_{n+1} - p\|) \\ & \quad + \frac{\rho_n}{\mu\alpha_n} [\|\tilde{A}_1 p\| \|v_n - p\| + \rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2]. \end{aligned} \tag{148}$$

Since $\alpha_n \rightarrow 0, \rho_n = o(\alpha_n)$ and $\|x_{n+1} - x_n\| = o(\rho_n)$, we find that

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{\|x_{n+1} - x_n\|}{\alpha_n} = \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{\|x_{n+1} - x_n\|}{\rho_n} \cdot \frac{\rho_n}{\alpha_n} = 0. \tag{149}$$

Hence, we conclude from (148) that for all $p \in VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1)$

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, w - p \rangle \\ &= \lim_{j \rightarrow \infty} \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n_j} - p \rangle \leq \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_n - p \rangle \\ &= \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_n - x_{n+1} \rangle + \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle) \\ &= \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \tilde{A}_2 p, x_{n+1} - p \rangle \leq 0, \end{aligned} \tag{150}$$

that is,

$$\langle \tilde{A}_2 p, p - w \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1). \tag{151}$$

Since \tilde{A}_2 is β -strongly monotone and L -Lipschitz continuous, by Minty's Lemma [23] we know that (151) is equivalent to the VIP

$$\langle \tilde{A}_2 w, p - w \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall p \in VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1). \tag{152}$$

This shows that $w \in VI(VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1), \tilde{A}_2)$. Considering $\{x^*\} = VI(VI(\Omega, \tilde{A}_1), \tilde{A}_2)$, we know that $w = x^*$. Thus, $\omega_w(x_n) = \{x^*\}$; that is, $x_n \rightarrow x^*$.

Next we prove that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - x^*\| = 0$. As a matter of fact, by utilizing (147) with $p = x^*$, we get

$$\begin{aligned} & \|x_{n+1} - x^*\|^2 \\ & \leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \\ & \quad \times [\|x_n - x^*\|^2 - 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \langle \tilde{A}_1 x^*, v_n - x^* \rangle \\ & \quad + 2\rho_n (1 - \beta_n) \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\| \|\tilde{v}_n - v_n\|] \\ & \quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 x^*, x_{n+1} - x^* \rangle \\ & \leq (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - x^*\|^2 \\ & \quad + 2\rho_n \|\tilde{A}_1 x^*\| \|v_n - x^*\| + 2\rho_n^2 \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 \\ & \quad - 2\mu\alpha_n \langle \tilde{A}_2 x^*, x_{n+1} - x^* \rangle \\ & = (1 - \alpha_n \tau) \|x_n - x^*\|^2 \\ & \quad + \alpha_n \tau \cdot \frac{2}{\tau} \left[\frac{\rho_n}{\alpha_n} \|\tilde{A}_1 x^*\| \|v_n - x^*\| \right. \\ & \quad \left. + \frac{\rho_n^2}{\alpha_n} \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 - \mu \langle \tilde{A}_2 x^*, x_{n+1} - x^* \rangle \right]. \end{aligned} \tag{153}$$

Since $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \alpha_n = \infty, \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\rho_n/\alpha_n) = 0$, and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \langle \tilde{A}_2 x^*, x^* - x_{n+1} \rangle = 0$ (due to $x_n \rightarrow x^*$), we deduce that $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \alpha_n \tau = \infty$, and

$$\begin{aligned} & \lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \frac{2}{\tau} \left[\frac{\rho_n}{\alpha_n} \|\tilde{A}_1 x^*\| \|v_n - x^*\| \right. \\ & \quad \left. + \frac{\rho_n^2}{\alpha_n} \|\tilde{A}_1 v_n\|^2 - \mu \langle \tilde{A}_2 x^*, x_{n+1} - x^* \rangle \right] = 0. \end{aligned} \tag{154}$$

Therefore, applying Lemma 18 to (153) we infer that $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \|x_n - x^*\| = 0$. This completes the proof. \square

Remark 26. In 2012, Ceng et al. [19] proposed and analyzed the following hybrid iterative method for finding a common element of the set of solutions of GMEP (3) and the set of fixed points of a finite family of nonexpansive mappings $\{S_i\}_{i=1}^N$.

Theorem CGY (see [19, Theorem 3.1]). *Let C be a nonempty closed convex subset of a real Hilbert space H . Let $\Theta : C \times C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a bifunction satisfying assumptions (H1)–(H4) and let $\varphi : C \rightarrow \mathbf{R}$ be a lower semicontinuous and convex function with restriction (A1) or (A2). Let the mapping $A : H \rightarrow H$ be ζ -inverse strongly monotone, and let $\{S_i\}_{i=1}^N$ be a finite family of nonexpansive mappings on H such that $(\cap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i)) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \neq \emptyset$. Let $F : H \rightarrow H$ be a κ -Lipschitzian and η -strongly monotone operator with constants $\kappa, \eta > 0$ and $V : H \rightarrow H$ a ρ -Lipschitzian mapping with a constant $\rho \geq 0$. Let $0 < \mu < 2\eta/\kappa^2$ and $0 \leq \gamma\rho < \tau$, where $\tau = 1 - \sqrt{1 - \mu(2\eta - \mu\kappa^2)}$. Suppose $\{\alpha_n\}$ and $\{\beta_n\}$ are two sequences in $(0, 1)$, $\{r_n\}$ is a sequence in $(0, 2\zeta]$, and $\{\mu_{i,n}\}_{i=1}^N$ is a sequence in $[a, b]$ with $0 < a \leq b < 1$. For every $n \geq 1$, let W_n be the W -mapping generated by S_1, S_2, \dots, S_N and $\mu_{1,n}, \mu_{2,n}, \dots, \mu_{N,n}$. Given $x_1 \in H$ arbitrarily, suppose the sequences $\{x_n\}$ and $\{u_n\}$ are generated iteratively by*

$$\begin{aligned} & \Theta(u_n, y) + \varphi(y) - \varphi(u_n) + \langle Ax_n, y - u_n \rangle \\ & + \frac{1}{r_n} \langle y - u_n, u_n - x_n \rangle \geq 0, \quad \forall y \in C, \end{aligned} \tag{155}$$

$$x_{n+1} = \alpha_n \gamma V x_n + \beta_n x_n + ((1 - \beta_n)I - \alpha_n \mu F) W_n u_n, \quad \forall n \geq 1,$$

where the sequences $\{\alpha_n\}, \{\beta_n\}, \{r_n\}$, and the finite family of sequences $\{\mu_{i,n}\}_{i=1}^N$ satisfy the following conditions:

- (i) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \alpha_n = 0$ and $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} \alpha_n = \infty$;
- (ii) $0 < \liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} \beta_n \leq \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} \beta_n < 1$;
- (iii) $0 < \liminf_{n \rightarrow \infty} r_n \leq \limsup_{n \rightarrow \infty} r_n < 2\zeta$ and $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (r_{n+1} - r_n) = 0$;
- (iv) $\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} (\mu_{i,n+1} - \mu_{i,n}) = 0$ for all $i = 1, 2, \dots, N$.

Then, both $\{x_n\}$ and $\{u_n\}$ converge strongly to $x^* \in \cap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A)$, where $x^* = P_{\cap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A)}(I - \mu F + \gamma V)x^*$ is a unique solution of the VIP

$$\begin{aligned} & \langle (\mu F - \gamma V)x^*, p - x^* \rangle \leq 0, \\ & \forall p \in \left(\bigcap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \right) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A). \end{aligned} \tag{156}$$

It is obvious that our iterative scheme (55) is very different from Yao, Liou, and Marino’s iterative one (13), Zeng, Wong, and Yao’s iterative one in Algorithm ZWY, and Ceng, Guu, and Yao’s iterative one (155). Here, the two-step iterative scheme in [7, Algorithm 3.2] is extended to develop our four-step

iterative scheme (55) for the THVI (16) by combining Korpelevich’s extragradient method, hybrid steepest-descent method, and averaged mapping approach to the gradient-projection algorithm. The problem of finding a point $x^* \in \cap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A)$ in [19] is extended to the more general problem of finding a point $x^* \in (\cap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i)) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \cap (\cap_{k=1}^M I(B_k, R_k)) \cap \Gamma$, which is involved in THVI (16). It is worth pointing out that under the lack of the assumptions similar to those in [6, Theorem 3.2], for example, $\{x_n\}$ is bounded, $\text{Fix}(T) \cap \text{int } C \neq \emptyset$ and $\|x - Tx\| \geq k \text{Dist}(x, \text{Fix}(T))$, $\forall x \in C$ for some $k > 0$, the sequence $\{x_n\}$ generated by (55) converges strongly to a point $u^* \in (\cap_{i=1}^N \text{Fix}(S_i)) \cap \text{GMEP}(\Theta, \varphi, A) \cap (\cap_{k=1}^M I(B_k, R_k)) \cap \Gamma =: \Omega$, which is a unique solution of the VIP $\langle \bar{A}_2 u^*, p - u^* \rangle \geq 0, \forall p \in \Omega$.
